Mrs. Seth Milbury.
Mrs. Seth (Hannah Giberson) Milbury, died very suddenly at her home in the Borough of Brooklyn, New York City, early Thursday morning, Jan. 30th, in the seventy-eighth year of her age.
Mrs. Milbury, widow of Seth Milbury, who died in 1901, was a daughter of Murphy and Lydia Stickney Giberson, of Monquart, (Bath), Carleton County, where she was born in 1830, and was known and related to a great number of people in this County and Province. In 1852 Hannah Giberson married Seth Milbury, of Wicklow, and made her home at Florenceville, till 1865, when the family removed to Wicklow, where they remained till 1891, when Mr. and Mrs. Milbury and their daughter Inda went to New York, whither all their sons had preceded them.

Mrs. Milbury came of Loyalist ancestry; the Gibersons, many of whom served in the British army, having emigrated from New York and New Jersey to New Brunswick at the close of the War of the Revolution. On her Mother's (the Stickney) side, she was descended from William Stickney, of Lincolnshire, England, who settled in Massachusetts in 1837. The Milbury family from Yorkshire, England, settled in 1642 at what is now Portsmouth, N. H. By blood and marriage, Mrs. Milbury was related to the Burpees, Barlters, Tilleyes, Wards, Hathaways, Squires, Esteys, McLods, Traffons, Applebys, Uptons, Lombards, Raymonds, and other well known New Brunswick families, and on her husband's side, through the Bulloch and Squires families, to President Roosevelt.

At fourteen years of age, Hannah Giberson became a member of the Free Baptist Church and her Christian life was sweetly consistent till the hour of her death. In her home the custom of daily family reading of the Scriptures and prayers was never omitted, and frequently, even in the last months of her life, Mrs. Milbury would recite a Psalm or chapter in place of the reading. In New York, she was a highly respected and beloved member of the Meroz Avenue Baptist Church the pastor of which, the Rev. Dr. W. C. P. Rhoades, preached the funeral sermon. Mr. Rhoades was a great favorite with Mrs. Milbury, and called himself one of her boys. In his sermon, he referred particularly to her bright, cherry, sunshiny nature, and paid a warm tribute to her sterling Christian character.

Although Mrs. Milbury came to New York at the age of 61, she made a large circle of friends, and was "Aunt Hannah" to a host of young people. For a number of years Mrs. Milbury had been in feeble health, but her buoyancy of nature and strength of mind were such that her interest in church and social and public matters remained keen and active till within two hours of her falling asleep, and in spite of her physical infirmities she had in late years traveled quite extensively. Last winter, with her daughter, she spent in Florida, and last summer, again with her daughter, she spent several weeks visiting relatives and friends in Carleton County, Fredericton, Sheffield and St. John. She frequently said that it was her last visit to the scenes of her childhood, and it was with extreme reluctance that she finally said "good-bye" to her native Province. The last night of her life Mrs. Milbury was particularly bright and happy, and speaking of her recent "home" trip, said it was the most delightful visit of her whole life. This was at ten o'clock in the evening; at five minutes after midnight, she had passed to the eternal.

Mrs. Milbury left four sons, Arthur Wellesley, Edward Goddard, L. A. Wilmore and Seth Ransom, and one daughter, Inda J., all living in New York. Her surviving brothers and sisters are: Samuel, Hamilton and Amos Giberson, and Mrs. Matthew Hutchinson, Mrs. Stephen Barker, and Mrs. Newman Estey.
