Judging by what we have heard from prominent men in different sections of the county it would seem to be well within the mark to predict the return of the whole government ticket by from four to five hundred majority. Scores of good solid conservatives who are disgusted with the methods and misrepresentations of the Opposition leaders have publicly signified their intention of supporting Jones, Carvell and Upham. The Opposition boast loudly of two men whose names were given last week in this paper as former Liberals now supporting the Opposition, but Mr. Carvell had 274 majority in 1904, so if two of these are now going the other way, the present Liberal ticket, we suppose, will have to be content with a majority of only 270.

Flemming, Smith and Munro are taking great pains to advertise their honesty. Is this not suggestive? Somebody must have doubted it.

All over the province a grand Liberal victory is assured. Mayor Sears, of St. John, in the last campaign an Opposition worker, is heading the Liberal ticket in that city. Mr. Winslow, of Chatham, five years ago with the Opposition, is also a Liberal candidate this time. W. S. Loggie, M. P., who won the battle in Northumberland for the Opposition in 1903 is now working might and main for the Government. In Sunbury county Mr. Hazen is strictly on the defensive. Here in Carleton the only hope of the Conservatives is to save Mr. Flemming, who is slated as the next Conservative candidate for the Commons, and who hopes through the aid of Liberal votes to keep in the Legislature for a year or so longer. The game is too thin not to be seen through.
