"I don't know why it is true," he complained, "but true it certainly is, that ours is the only learned profession wherein a man doesn't feel it incumbent upon himself to be sure of a satisfactory income before by marriage he increases his expenses and responsibilities. You all know this to be a fact, and yet none of you, I venture to say, can give a reason for it."
"I once put the problem before my dear and learned old friend, Bishop Williams, of Connecticut, but he only shook his venerable head."
"I have never been able to answer that question," he said. "All I know is what you know; as soon as a man gets a surplice he want a petticoat."

The Wonders of Modern Medicine.

Just as quinine acts to counteract malaria, so the antitoxins counteract the symptoms of the various diseases in which they are used. If used early in the disease, they are most efficacious, and even if used late they are of service.
This is proved by the fact that in 1893, before the antitoxin of diphtheria was used there were 6,468 cases in New York hospitals, of which 1,962 were fatal—i. e., 34 per cent.; while in 1906 there were 7,444 cases and only 731 deaths—i. e., 9 per cent. In London in 1894 there were 3,866 cases, of

which 1,035 were fatal; while in 1901 there were 7,522 cases, of which only 849 were fatal. In America, among 5,576 private cases, not in the hospitals, in 1896, only 491 were fatal. Taking the cases the world over, it may be stated that the mortality in diphtheria has been reduced from 35 per cent. to 9 per cent. Another application of these facts has been made in the discovery of the use of antitoxin in cerebro-spinal meningitis by Flexner in the Rockefeller Institute in New York in 1907—a discovery as important and far-reaching as that of Behring.

There are few diseases more dreaded by the doctors than cerebro-spinal meningitis, or spotted fever. There was no means of treatment known last year, when 812 persons died in New York from it. The mortality in the epidemic was 79 per cent. Under the new antitoxin treatment the mortality is reduced to 29 per cent., and will be much more reduced when the methods of application are more fully perfected.
It may not be generally known here that by inoculation the English troops in India have been largely prevented from contracting typhoid fever during the past two years, and thus this disease, which had long been a terror to medical men in the tropics among the masses of soldiers, is no longer dreaded—Dr. M. Allen Starr, in Harper's Magazine.

The Time For Cultivation.

The cultivation of the root crops of the farm should not be neglected. The careful housing of the crop of hay is not a more important matter than is the attention which is accorded to the corn crop, the turnip and mangel departments about the same time.

Every added stirring up which the ground receives means so much more valuable food for next winter, a little additional increase, which all goes to profit. After running expenses are met, then it is the remainder that counts. The cultivation which is accorded to the growing crop of roots at this time of the year meets with an immediate response. Heavy yields are almost certain, if they are properly cared for. There is no better promise of plenty and prosperity than is a bountiful supply of roots and corn, for the coming winter. Not only will the immediate crop be a much heavier one, but the soil will benefit in many ways. Now is the time, when the weeds, which are usually common enough, may be fought to a finish. The continual cultivation of the ground induces just the proper conditions to make them sprout, and the next cultivation kills the young sprouted weed, while coaxing the appearance of any other seeds which the ground may have fallen heir to. The benefit of the soil itself is also great. It is broken up, loosened, rendered more friable, the decomposition of vegetable matter is encouraged, the admission of the air assists in this, and in the retention of moisture in just the right degree to stimulate vegetation, and maintain the conditions most favorable to the production of a good crop this year and a better one next. There is a great big generous premium on every minute spent with the cultivator in the corn and root field.
