**Property and Liability.**

(Manchester (N. B.) Union.)  
The opinion, quite generally held, that a person has a right to do, or not to do, according to his personal desire, with his own property, and that a trespasser has no right to damages in case of injury, has received a staggering blow in a \$6000 verdict returned by a jury in the United States circuit court at Trenton, New Jersey. The suit was that of a Jersey City girl who was injured while at play on a pile of iron girders owned by a New York company. The case had been thrown out of the New Jersey State courts on the ground that a trespasser had no legal redress for injury; but the recent decision of the United States court that a person is bound, even on his private property, to use care to pile in a workmanlike manner any goods which might attract children at play caused the suit to be brought in the United States court at Trenton. The jury, after twenty-four hours deliberation, sustained the liability view. A word to the wise is unnecessary.
