Roman Villa Unearthed.

The Rounded Cutaway.

Another device instrumental in suiting the Directoire coat to the short skirt is the round ed cut-away, with the back cut in one with the girdle. In another, a deep, square yoke with narrow extensions, at both front and back, serves to lend a favorable effect. Iu both of these models double box plaits, graduated in width toward the bottom, give the proper lines. In the latter, the box plait is inturned and formed by an empiecement inserted at the patch pockets.

To be strictly correct, the walking suit that typifies the Directoire adaptations has a coat which escapes the hem of the dress by an inch, with a centre back seam, which curves not so much as to lose the precious hiplessness, nor so little that the whole garment appears to have been designed for another person than the wearer. That centre seams in the back or the two side seams that re. gulate the back, as the case may be, are the two most difficult points of construction.

Where the skirts are not made in one with the bodice, they are finished at the top with a strap or band so that the dividing line is inconspicuous, or else, as is more frequently the case, the trimming of the one piece is continued in the other contrasting material seems to be tacitly reserved for more formal costumes.
