**Selling Gowns to Americans in Paris.**

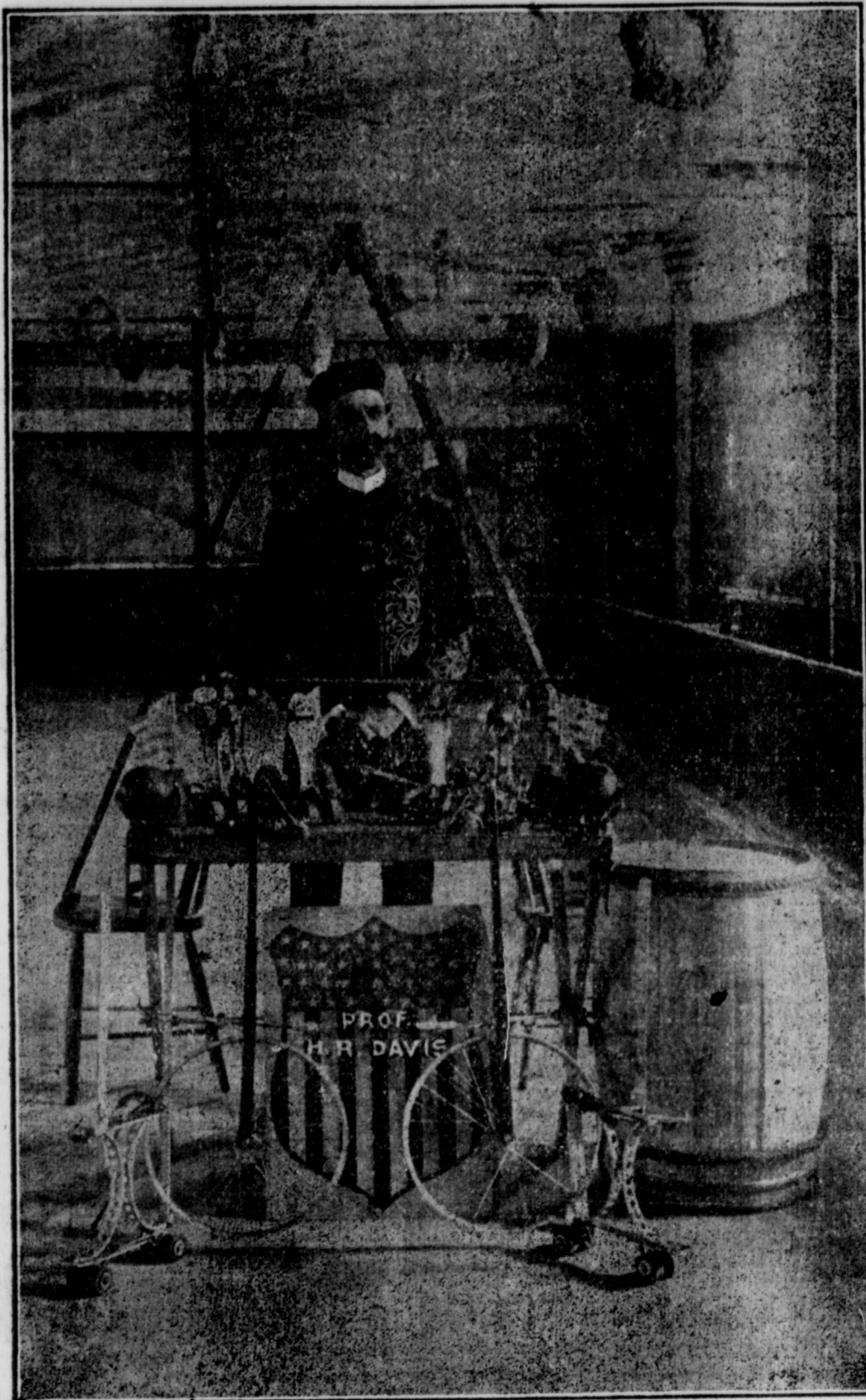

He is a past master of the little rollers, and performs wonderful feats and amazing and dangerous stunts. The Prof. entertained us for one hour and thirty minutes. Prof. Davis has been the best drawing card the rink ever had, as this is his third exhibition. It is safe to say Aroostook will never see his equal. Some of his tricks composed of skating on toe and heel rollers, skating backwards and frontwards on one

toe, skating on loose rollers balancing a rod while in action, tricks with a chair, skating on two twenty inch wheels clapped the climax until he sprang another sensation that of shooting the chute at an angle of 45 degrees. The most amazing and dangerous stunt was that of performing on a barrel on top of a rickety table, performing on the large globe rollers and stilts was marvelous. The great jump over eight chairs and a barrel shows the Prof's agility as an athlete. He was amply rewarded for his excellent exhibition by generous applause and a solid gold medal presented by the manager of the rink.
