#### Overskirt Variations.

New variations in the overskirt continue to appear. One of the most recent is the panel tunic. In this the tunic is cut circular but is not too full. Around the hips it is glove-fitting, and at the bottom it is turned in a deep hem and machine-stitched twice. Then at the centre, front and back and at the sides, there are sash-like panels gradually widening toward the bottom, where each is cut in a long, curved point which hangs below the tunic and over the underskirt. These panels are of embroidery or net or of some contrasting material, and are fitted to the skirt so that they accentuate the lines of the figure.

Another new suggestion of the sash overskirt consists of five lengths of full width crepe or silk—crepe is especially suitable. The ends are finished with fringe or otherwise decorated, and while one of the pieces is draped in regulation overskirt manner, another length falls over it in front and another in back, and at each side the lengths fall from underneath and are long enough with the fringe, to touch the hem of the underskirt. In still another new model the four lengths or sashes hang straight from the Empire girdle and are slashed in deeply,

forming long points or in a square effect to form a Greek border. In the latter case the lengths must be the same.

The new cloth gowns show the same simplicity generally that characterized those of the spring, but there is more of a tendency to balance the skirt and waist decoration. There is little choice, as far as popular sentiment goes, between the lengthwise trimming and that extending around, for wherever the latter is used there is almost invariably a vertical line to counteract it, so the effect of length is preserved.

#### Hasheesh of Greece.

Consul Edward I. Nathan of Patris, Greece writes about the Greek preparation and exportation of hasheesh: "Hasheesh, that strange drug which has given our language its word 'assassin'—a man so frenzied by the drug that he accomplishes murder—is used by the Persian, Turk and Egyptians in a manner akin to the use of opium by the Chinese. It is the product of a plant grown in large quantities in the Peloponnesus (southern Greece), in the district about Tripolizza. The plant grows to a height of about four feet, and its branches are thickly covered with small leaves and studded with tiny seed."

"The entire plant, stalk and branches, is cut within a few inches of the root and laid out in the sun to dry. The branches are then rubbed to separate the seeds, and these in turn are ground into a fine powder, which constitutes the drug. The drug has the power of inducing sleep and producing pleasant and fantastic dreams. Continued use of hasheesh renders its devotees wild and reckless and results in a complete wreck of their mental and physical constitution.

"For this reason the Egyptian Government has prohibited the importation of the drug and recently entered into a convention with Greece to prevent its exportation from there to Egypt, where the consumers of hasheesh are very numerous. The drug is practically never used in Greece, but is now exported to the various ports in England, Austria, France and Italy, and from there much, no doubt, ultimately finds its way to Egypt."

#### St. Paul's Serpent.

There are still to be found in Malta a number of small stones shaped and colored like the eyes, tongues and other parts of serpents. The superstitious among the Maltese connect these with the traditions that St. Paul, when shipwrecked, was cast on their island, and that it was there that while lighting a bundle of sticks for a fire a viper fastened on the Apostles hand. St Paul calmly shook the reptile off into the flames, and no harm followed. The natives, therefore, wear these stones as talismans in which character they suppose them serviceable in warding off dangers from snake-bites and the influence of poisons. They are found in "St. Paul's Cave," embedded in clay, and are set in rings and bracelets, and when found to be in the shape of a tongue, or liver, or heart, are hung round the neck. They are also taken internally, dissolved in wine, which method it attended, according to some people, by more immediate results.

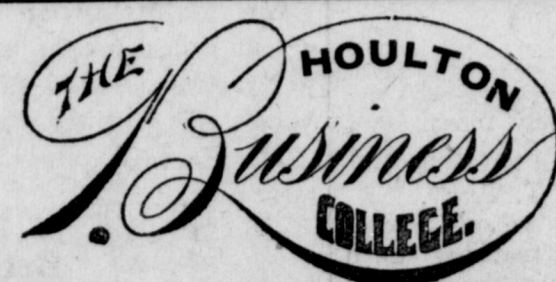
