Woodstock Cold Storage.

The Provincial Government passed an order in council guaranteeing the bonds of the new cold storage company at Woodstock on 75 per cent of their plant not to exceed \$10,000. This guarantee takes the place of the one passed for the now defunct company which had the project in hand but which never got down to real business, and is made in accordance with the Act of the Legislature.

The following are the members and officers of the above mentioned company: E. R. Teed, president; A. W. Hay, vice-president, E. W. Mair, sec. treasurer, A. G. Bailey and C. D. Johnston.

The old Connell brick power house has been fitted up for the storage plant, the windows have been bricked up and a large roomy cellar has been prepared by excavation. The building has been insulated with cork slabs in cement by the Armstrong Cork Co.

A "Line British" 15 ton ammonia refrigerating plant is being installed and will be completed in about three weeks. There will be one freezing room and all the other rooms will be equipped so that the temperature can be regulated from 10% up.

The basement will be used for storing barrelled goods, the first floor for freezing and storing meats, and the upper floor will be used for butter, with a capacity of 160,000 pounds.

School Matters.

The school trustees have about made arrangements to accommodate the different grades after the holidays are over. Two rooms in the Graham building, three in the new all of the Winslow building and the Sloyd school room, have been secured until the new school building will be completed.

G. Ernest Fairweather, architect, of St. John, was here on Saturday and had a consultation with the school board. H. H. Mott, St. John, had a consultation with the board yesterday. Nothing has as yet been decided upon, but it is altogether likely the new building will be of brick and modern in construction as regards sanitation and heating, and will cost in the vicinity of \$25,000.

Born in Woodstock.

The friends of William MacDonald will regret to learn that he passed away early Thursday morning, after a brief illness, at the residence of his daughter, 84 Forest avenue, Bangor. Mr. MacDonald was born at Woodstock, New Brunswick, Sept. 12, 1832. With his parents he moved to Bangor while he was a small child. He was a carpenter by profession. He served two terms in the City Council of Bangor as a member from ward 7. In former years he was an active member of Oriental Lodge of Oddfellows. His wife died in October, 1887, since which time he resided with his daughter, Mrs. Ora W. Knight. Other surviving relatives are two brothers, J. Wallace MacDonald, of Stoneham, Mass., and Thomas S. MacDonald, of Bangor.—Bangor Commercial.

Death of Mrs. Wm. Mills.

The death occurred on Sunday of Mrs. William Mills of Middle Simonds. She had been about the house as usual Sunday morning and attended the Adventist prayer meeting in which she took part. During service she was taken ill. Death came in a few minutes after reaching home. Paralysis was the cause.
