We hope that Queen Victoria's example will cause them to revise their notions of girlhood, womanhood, motherhood and inspire them to read the best books in general subjects.
It was Queen Victoria's girlhood that made her womanhood and enabled her queenhood.

And this happened because in her young days she cared for the graces of the mind and heart and read the books which made her queenly in thought and feeling.
Every Canadian girl, if she follow Queen Victoria's example, may make herself also queenly in beauty of mind and heart.
