"What's that you said?"

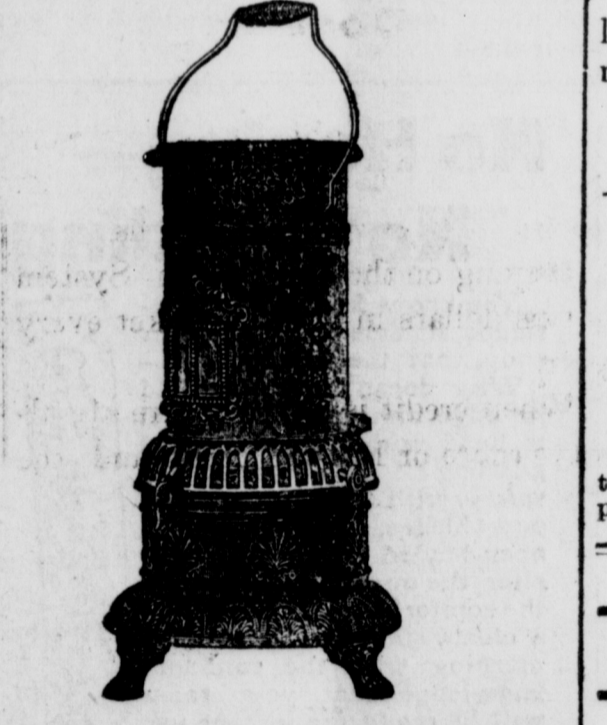
"I said, show me an Irishman and I'll show you a coward," said the little fellow, whose knees were shaking under him.

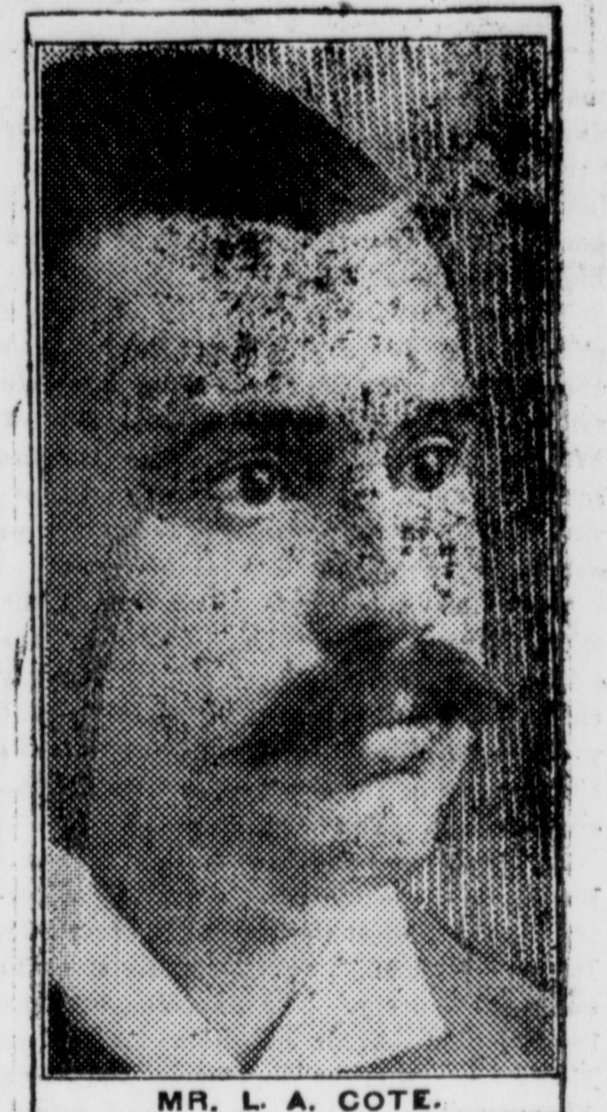
