Cleaning Light Frocks.

Silk frocks that have been spotted by cream or any greasy substance can be cleaned with chloroform, which is better to use on delicate fabrics than is gasoline. Be sure not to use the chloroform or ether, lay a piece of clear white flannel on the ironing board, spread the garment with the soiled spot over this, with the silk or other fabric stretched smooth and flat. Wet a bit of white flannel in the liquid, and thoroughly moisten the spot, then rub gently. Note that the chloroform is very volatile, and hence you must work rapidly. The instant you have moistened the flannel, apply it to the spot, and also immediately re-cock the bottle. Take care not to inhale the fumes from the bottle. As soon as the spot is dry, which it will soon be from evaporation, apply more of the liquid, and repeat until the spot is quite gone.

Magnesia will be found useful in removing grease spots from fine cloth. Rub the magnesia into the spot while it is fresh, leave it for several hours, then brush it out, and if the spot is not quite gone rub in as much more of the magnesia as the fabric will take up. Put a piece of white blotting paper under the spotted part of the garment, and another piece over it, and press with a warm—
not hot—iron.
