Cheaper Fuel For Farmers.

"The time is not far distant," said N. C. White in the "Plankinton," when the American farmer will be making his own fuel out of corn stalks and other refuse about the farm. There has, I know, been a great deal of disappointment over denatured alcohol. When the law was first passed every one expected that it meant an immediate change, and all a farmer would have to do would be to get a kettle and a few lengths of copper pipe and start in producing his own fuel.

"It has been found, however that there is much to learn before this time arrives. The work of discovering a cheap and practical method for the farmers to make this commercial alcohol has been carried forward by the experiment station of the Department of Agriculture and along in the fall it is expected that the department will have a complete plant in operation and through this, men from all the agricultural colleges throughout the country will come to learn the method of producing alcohol.

"They in turn will teach it to the farmers in their States. The experiments now are being directed, I am told, towards the use of cheap, starchy material about the farm at a cost where it can compete not only with gasolene, but with kerosene. If successful, an entirely new field of endeavor will be opened, as with cheap fuel, much can be done that now is not attempted because of the expense. I understand that representatives of the Agricultural Department are now in Europe for the purpose of investigating the methods there of making denatured alcohol."-[Milwaukee Sentinel.
