WOODSTOCK, N. B. SEPT. 16, 1908.

The other day Miss Iva Gayton, of Bath, Me., arrived here by train and drove to Knowlesville to visit at the home of Charles H. Gayton.

All summer long tramps have infested the region hereabout so that it is getting unsafe, particularly for ladies, to go abroad after nightfall. There is hardly a train passes but one sees specimens of the Goodman Gonrong stowed away on the bumpers of the cars. Many drop off at Hartland and take a turn around the country-side—each avowing his intention of seeking work on the Trans-continental. Many are headed the other way, and all refuse work.

Today the marriage of Miss Myrtle McFarland and Carey Dickinson, of Victoria Corner will be solemnized at the bride's home, Hartland.

Last week twenty carloads of deal, lath, dimensions, and wood were shipped from Sayre's yard. That is a record breaker. Not all of this output was cut in one week, however, as for some time they have been yarding their deal on the chance of a raise, which has come. The mill has run remarkably steady all summer, there being few days when it was shut down for repairs or other causes. Throughout the province, particularly in St. John, lumber mills have been doing very little; in many cases nothing, all summer. This week Sayre's mill will start running on deal for the British market. The output will be shipped to St. John by rail.

The freight traffic on the C. P. R. has been the heaviest ever during the past fortnight and there is no sign of its letting up until next spring. The potato shipments, from both sides of the line, are amazing. Two or three "double-headers" freights pass every day while the whistles of trains may be heard at all hours of the night. Several engines have been sent here from other divisions to assist in the hauling.

Frank E. McGee, of Fort Fairfield, was visiting his parents at Somerville over Sunday. Mr. McGee says he has raised a big crop in this, his first, year in Aroostook. He has forty acres in potatoes which are a full crop.

On Friday evening next there will be a supper at Rockland in aid of the Baptist church at that place. Rev. J. H. Copeland will also give a lecture illustrated by lantern slides. The evening promises to be most enjoyable and well worth the sum charged, 30 cents for both supper and lecture.

Woodford Craig, who has been having a bad run of fever, is well on the way to recovery, under the skillful care of Dr. Curtis and nurse, Laura Jones.

On Friday, Frank Adair, of Carlisle, while at work laying a floor in a lumber camp for F. E. Sayre & Co. on the head waters of the Becaguimac, had the misfortune to cut his foot very badly. The accident occurred about three o'clock and his friends at once started for Hartland with him, while Dr. Curtis was summoned to meet them as the man was bleeding badly. It was seven o'clock when they met near the residence of Wesley Jones. There the doctor dressed the wound and found that one toe was split its whole length and the cut extended two inches up the foot splitting it clear through. A portion of one toe was amputated, but otherwise the man will be whole after a short time. He was very weak from loss of blood.

The DISPATCH has received from Charles Hurst, representing the Hartland Poultry Yards at the Halifax exhibition, a copy of the Herald of that city showing the poultry prize list. The number of their prizes was given last week, 57 first and 33 second, and 40 these several more were added. An Inter-

esting feature was that the local concern took prizes in about 90 per cent of the various classes, and almost the same amount of the prize money. Hartland has at least one industry to be proud of.

Friday evening Hartland had its first opportunity to hear the Florenceville band. The organization certainly is a credit to the upriver village.

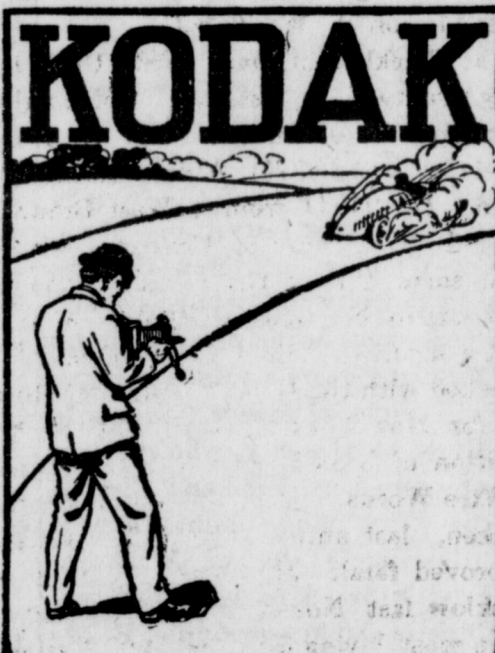
