**Preventing Seasickness.**

The gyroscope, which science has been seeking with some little success to apply to single-rail railroads, now looms large as the possible way of escape from seasickness, at least as far as that distressing malady is caused by a ship's rolling in the sea.

Everybody who has sailed the ocean blue, knows that some ships roll heavily in the slightest of cross-seas, and some have achieved unenviable reputations by rolling in no waves at all, careering along through glassy waters with a cradle-like effect very trying to "poor sailors."

The gyroscope, which is a heavy fly wheel set in a sort of gimbal arrangement, is supposed to counteract this tendency, meeting the push of a cross-wave with a corresponding and steadying counter-push, and this keeping the steamer upright, just as the car running or standing still on its single rail is kept in equilibrium by the scientific agency.

It will be a boon to ocean travelers if this is found to work.

## The Newest Fabrics.

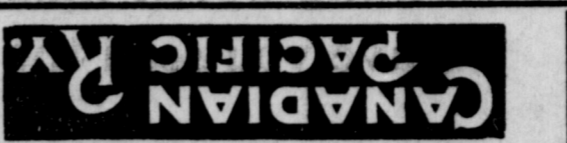
