### Town Council.

The regular monthly meeting of the town Council was held Monday evening in the Council chambers.

C. W. Dugan, the newly elected councillor was sworn in by the clerk.

His Worship congratulated Coun. Dugan on his election by acclamation to the council, and hoped that he would find everything harmonious.

Coun. Dugan made a short speech appropriate to the occasion.

Coun. Sutton said he was appointed to wait upon the local members of the provincial legislature, in regard to the concrete wall at the Meduxnekeag bridge. He saw Mr. Munro who told him he thought the government would pay for a part of the work.

His Worship said he saw Mr. Flemming a few days ago and took him down to look at the work. He made no promises but thought it reasonable that the government would pay for a part of the work.

His Worship told the council that he and the clerk had made a satisfactory settlement with J. N. W. Winslow in regard to taxes and the work now being done near the bridge.

A discussion in regard to back taxes took place and on motion of Coun. Thorne it was decided to send each of the delinquents a statement of their indebtedness and give them until August 25th in which to pay up. After that date executions will be served.

Coun. Sutton, who had been acting as chairman of the street committee in the absence of Coun. Smith, was appointed permanent Chairman and Coun. Dugan was appointed Chairman of the poor committee.

The bill between the residence of John McLaughlan and St. Luke's church will be scraped off and the old well which has been in a dangerous condition for the past year will be filled up.

The Dominion Inspector of Weights and Measures was here last week and condemned the scales.

Coun. Fawcett said a new set should be purchased and properly installed in a building so that they would not be effected by the weather.

Coun. Dugan said he had some experience with the present set of scales and he knew they were badly out of order.

Coun. Thorne moved that the scales committee be authorized to purchase a set of scales. Carried.

Howard McDonald applied for a license to sell beer on Broadway near exhibition building. Referred to license committee.

Coun. Fisher moved that a new and up-to-date set of ladders be purchased for the use of the fire department. Carried.

His Worship said the street committee had notified Coun. Dugan that his building is four feet out on the street, and he thought that since Coun. Dugan was now sworn to look after the interests of the town, he would move his building back.
