### Maritime Boys' Camp.

Boys all over the maritime provinces are now thinking about their holidays, and they as well as their parents are planning for the usual outing. One of the very best places for a boy to spend a fortnight is at Maritime Boys' Camp.

For the past fifteen years the Maritime Boys' Camp has been widening. Boys who have been to our camps need no inducement to come with us this year. To the boys who have not had that privilege we extend an invitation to spend a pleasant and profitable vacation at our camping ground.

WHO MAY GO.

The object of these camps is to provide for the boys a most enjoyable two weeks' holiday under the best possible influences. Parents desirous of having their boys enjoy an outing can find no place where a boy will have more enjoyment than at one of these camps. Many who have the welfare of boys at heart have made it possible for some boy to attend and thus assist him to a higher view of life.

This year the camp is open to any boy whose application is approved by the local leader. Though the camp is intended for Y. M. C. A. boys it is not restricted to them, but any who are interested enough to attend will have the privilege of applying.

Nothing is so good as hearty out-door life, and we plan to have real camp life which every boy enjoys.

THE CAMPING GROUND.

The camp will be held again this year on the ground found so suitable, in every way—Robinson's Point, on Grand Lake up the St. John River.

The camping ground will satisfy every reasonable desire. The tents will be pitched on a grassy slope which rises from the shore to the higher land above where a smooth grassy field will give abundance of room for base-ball and other games.

The smooth, long sandy beach and the calm water will bring joy to the heart of the bather and will afford ample opportunity for boating, bathing and aquatic sports. Near the tents is a spring from which bubbles up cool refreshing water.

JULY 8TH TO JULY 22ND.

The camp will be held during the two weeks commencing Wednesday July 8th. Campers from the southern and eastern end of New Brunswick will leave St. John on Wednesday morning (rain or shine) and those going from the northern part of the province and the North Shore will leave Fredericton the same date. The respective steamers will land their happy parties right at the camp grounds.

Here we will find that our faithful advance party has everything in readiness for our coming, and our experienced cooks who have been with our party for years, will have a hearty repast prepared. The camp will continue till the 22nd of July when we re-embark for home.

APPLICATIONS.

All applications must be made on the form that will be supplied by any Y. M. C. A. secretary. At least one dollar must accompany the application, and if for any reason the application cannot be accepted the money will be returned; but if accepted the money is placed to the credit of the applicant.

The camp is very popular every year and will no doubt be more so this year, but as only a limited number can be accommodated, those first registered will receive first consideration. It is expected that about seventy-five boys will be in attendance.

THE COST.

Although in the past the Camp has never quite paid expenses we are anxious to keep the price where it will be within the reach of all. The entire expense for the two weeks in camp will be \$7.50 provided that not less than one dollar is sent with the application. It is urged that in every case possible, the entire amount be sent with the application.

In every case, however, the entire amount must be in the leader's hands before leaving for Camp.

LEADER AND ASSISTANTS.

The Camp will be under the leadership and management of Mr. Frank Eymann, Physical Director of the Y. M. C. A., Moncton. He will be assisted by a number of young men of Christian character, carefully selected by the Committee, many of whom have attended former camps, and all of whom are in sympathy with the boys and with the general objects of the camp.

FEATURES.

Plans are being made for a number of attractive features. Concerts will be arranged from time to time by local camp talent. The old camp fire after supper will not be forgotten. The Camp newspaper will be read every day, brimful of camp items, wise and otherwise. Special speakers will visit the camp and address the boys on subjects of interest to them. The spiritual life will not be neglected. A regular daily Bible Class is held. The attendance at this, optional, but most of the boys enjoy the class. On Sundays there will be church service in the morning and a Boys Own Meeting in the evening.

OF ESPECIAL INTEREST.

For each group of boys living in a tent we plan to have an Assistant Leader, who is responsible for those in his care. Outside of the tents any group of boys is in charge of the highest ranking Leader present. Experience tells us that, under these conditions the boys can be allowed much liberty; hence few rules are required. The following however, we consider imperative.

1. No fire-arms or air-rifles will be allowed.
2. None of the boys shall enter the water for bathing or swimming except at regular appointed times. Ample opportunity will be given all to enter the water twice a day.

Visitors and friends will be welcomed at the Camp. Any person wishing to visit the Camp can obtain the regular excursion rates by applying at the ticket offices. We cannot provide accommodation over night.

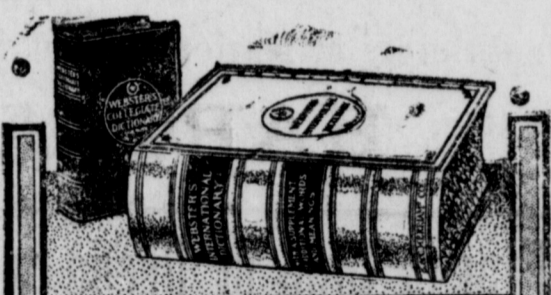
