Learning Made a Pleasure.
 (New York Sun.)

A curious and interesting experiment in school education has been carried on in Berlin for the past year, and with highly satisfactory results. The curious teaching of the school is the total want of method, the principle followed being that learning has to be made a pleasure. About 30 pupils assemble each morning in a villa in the suburb of Gross-Lichterfeld. On the entrance of the schoolmaster he finds the pupils, girls and boys of from 10 to 16, sitting or standing about in small groups, cheerfully chatting. There is no sharp bringing of the heels together, no rising to "attention," as in State and municipal institutions.

An hour of general instruction follows, the teacher opening the ball by saying, for example, "Little Hilda wanted to know at the last lesson why bodies are of such different colors," and thereupon one of the other pupils explains in his or her childish way what the reason is. Sometimes the explainer is interrupted by cries or corrections from the other pupils. Or a general discussion begins which soon branches out into questions and explanations concerning motor cars or canals, or somnambulism.

The pupils behave just as they like, stand as they like and sit as they like, the frequent shout of the ordinary Prussian school teacher, "Sit straight!" never being heard. No angry word is ever used or needed, there is not a rod in the place, and after the hour of general instruction the pupils betake themselves to their favorite study. Ambition is not the motive to work, but only love of the work and pleasure in the learning of it.

FOR CAMPERS.

Don'ts That May Save Many Thousand Dollars.

1. Don't, when in the woods, throw down a lighted match, cigar-stub or other flaming object; make sure that the flame has been thoroughly extinguished before throwing it away.
2. Don't build your camp fire larger than is necessary.
3. Don't, under any circumstances, leave your fire unguarded, even for a comparatively short time; see that it is dead out before you go away.
4. Don't build your fire in leaves, rotten wood or other inflammable material.
5. Don't build your fire against a large or hollow log, where it is hard to be sure when it has been entirely put out.

To these "don'ts" it may be added that in windy weather, or in a dangerous place, it is well to confine the fire in a hole dug clean down to the mineral soil. A fire may smoulder in the humus, or "duff" for days, only waiting for a strong breeze to fan it into a flame that may burn over miles of timber.

Summer tourists and campers unfortunately have a bad reputation among the owners of timber-limits as being a frequent cause of fires. Such fires could be prevented, almost without exception, by a little extra care on the part of the campers, who have been the unintentional cause of much forest destruction, and who have just as real an interest in the preservation of the forests as the owners of the timber themselves. The rules given above are the result of long experience

and observation on the part of many woodsmen and lumbermen as to the origin of fires from this cause, and are earnestly commended to the attention of campers, sportsmen and others.

The need for observing them is emphasized by the occurrence a few days ago of serious fires in the Lake St. John district in Quebec, one village being wiped out; the fires are thought to have originated from fires left by fishermen.

New Recipes Add To The Picnic Lunch.

A sandwich which is a little more trouble, but which quite repays for the effort to make it, is made by chopping English walnuts and mixing with cream cheese and a little chopped watercress, finishing with a little mayonnaise. Add a spray of cress after the mixture is spread on the bread.

At a picnic given last summer one of the girls brought tiny rolls, not over two inches in diameter and made quite round in shape. The tops of each roll had been cut to form a lid, the crumbs pulled out and the cavity filled with chopped chicken, seasoned with salt and black pepper, and made moist with very thick cream.

Every one has a favorite recipe for deviled eggs, and the usual one is to mash the yolks of hard-boiled eggs, add mustard, salt and pepper to taste, with enough vinegar to make the mixture moist, and finally a little chopped meat. When well mixed, it is molded into balls and returned to the cavity in the whites of the eggs. A good variation of this is to add grated cheese instead of meat, and mayonnaise or cream salad dressing instead of vinegar.
