WOODSTOCK, N. B. OCT. 21, 1908.

Mr. Alexander and family, as has already been announced, intend remaining in the west permanently; while Mrs. Baird goes intending to spend the winter, at least, with her daughter, Miss Laura, who went there last year. Monday evening, the eve of the departure of the Alexander family, there was a large gathering of friends in the United Baptist church to join in wishing them one and all success in the Golden State. There was a short program of music, and Mr. John Barnett made a feeling address, and gave presentations as follows: To Mr. Alexander, a gold headed cane, from the friends left behind; to Mrs. Alexander, a jewel case, from the same source; to Miss Helen, a bracelet, from her young friends; and to Miss Dorothy, a pretty clock from the members of the Methodist choir. Her sister, Miss Maude, will in November go to Bermuda to engage in the same work. Hon. J. K. Flemming came near being minus the house he lives in the other day. Men who were engaged installing an acetylene lighting plant, in the course of their work, opened an up-stairs closet-door and were confronted with a belch of flame and smoke. It required some hasty work to extinguish the fire, which, if undiscovered a few minutes longer, might have destroyed the dwelling. Mr. Flemming's young daughter had just previously been in the closet with a lighted match, and the supposition is that the stub was dropped among some of the inflammable contents of the closet. Little damage was done.

William and Frank Grant returned last week from the Northwest, whither they had gone on the harvest excursion.

George G. Gray is in a very poorly condition, suffering acutely from stomach and heart trouble.

Reuben Hagerman and Hayden Hamm returned on Saturday evening from the Nashua where they had been on a hunting expedition. They got no large game, but met with plenty of evidence that moose had recently been in the place they visited. Mr. Hamm had been there once before this season and got his moose. At that time he saw three bull and ten cow moose in one day.

On Thursday H. N. Boyer and Joseph McGee each shipped a carload of dressed pork from Hartland and Florenceville. The combined shipment amounted to thirty tons, and the farmers received an aggregate sum of \$4,800.00 for their pork. The two carloads went to Halifax.

Reuben H. Hagerman, who was set back from night operator to day assistant at the station, has refused the latter situation, leaving the employ of the C. P. R. altogether. He has about decided to accept a position on the Bangor & Aroostook railway, of which his cousin W. G. Tinker, is chief operator.

It is sincerely hoped that now election is passed, that all the hard feelings that may have arisen between man and man may be smoothed away before the week is ended.

McCollom & Murdock are this year lumbering on the Restigouche and have their crews all at work. D. H. Nixon also is sending men to the Restigouche, and both firms cut for William Richards Co. of Campbellton. It is impossible to make an estimate of what the cut this year will total. A somewhat less number of men are being employed, but if the market turns favourable they will continue to cut as long as the winter weather permits. Wages are hardly as high as they were last season, but the man with a team gets better than forty dollars, while choppers command \$26 to \$28 per month. Other men get from \$20 to \$25. Keswick & Potts are operating on the Black River for Randolph and Baker. Owing to his recent attack of typhoid fever, Woodford Craig is doubtful of operating at all this year.

It is not for political purposes that the DISPATCH correspondent mentions the fact that on Saturday the patches on the Hartland bridge numbered 173, nor that the caretaker was met with a wheelbarrow load of at least twenty more; but it through the belief that constant agitation the bridge may as soon as possible be refloored with enduring hardwood. In 1891 the Hartland Advertiser began an agitation for a bridge across the river, and the agitation was kept up unceasingly until 1898 when the paper suggested the organization of a local board of trade with a view to better getting what was needed. The bridge came; and now the bridge is going. We hope that the new Commissioner of Public Works will look at it some day and at least make a promise. All remember that the old government was good at that at least.

At the N. B. and P. E. I. Sabbath School Association held last week at St. Stephen Mrs. O. E. Steeves of Victoria was awarded the First Standard Diploma having made an average of 99 1/2 and stood third in merit in a class of 59 students. 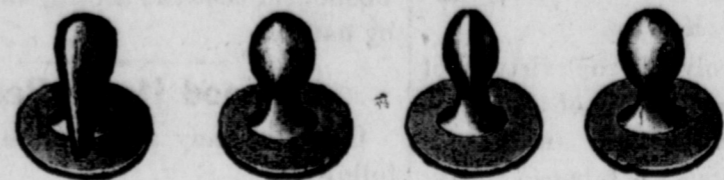
