## The Markets.

There is a continued brisk demand for all kinds of produce, and a big business is going on at all shipping points. This will without any doubt be the banner year for Carleton county. While farmers have for two months been busy hauling potatoes, the bulk of their pork, butter, beef, hay and oats, are yet to be marketed; and not more than half the potatoes are in yet. Everyone has marvelled at the heavy freight traffic on the railway, but this has hardly begun. When sledding comes and hay and oat shipments are added to the potato movement there will be something doing.
