It is expected that the new river steamer for the route between Fredericton and Woodstock will be constructed at St. John. The boat will be a stern wheeler and will likely cost close on to \$10,000. A meeting of the company being organized by Mr. Robert Scott, of Dumfries, will be called in a short time.

On Saturday afternoon Messrs Roy Watt and Beresford Connell, and Misses Elsie G. and Edna Phelan, went from Woodstock to Bristol by train and Sunday morning embarked in a canoe for the trip home. At Hartland they stopped at "Butter Nut Lodge," inhabited by Walter Sprague, Arthur Kyle, and others, a pleasant Matheson's Island, and spent a pleasant half-hour.

IN THE estimates brought down at the present session of Parliament the sum of \$5000.00 was voted for dredging the St. John river between Woodstock and Fredericton. It is expected that a survey of the river between the above points will be made at an early date. The farmers on both sides of the river are entitled to a steamboat service such as they have below Fredericton.
