With Face Toward The Foe.

The other day in Kansas there died a gentleman, General Hugh Cameron, at the age of eighty odd years.

For forty years General Cameron had been known as the "Kansas Hermit," because he lived in a sequestered spot, close to nature. His home was a rude hut and his companions were the birds and squirrels and some domesticated animals.

The Wichita Eagle, in a long editorial about man, muses morally thus: "He lived a simple life of great contentment and self-satisfaction and he prolonged it a few milestones beyond eighty in the enjoyment of the most extraordinary good health. What is better for a man? Why chase after the other things that bring only disappointments and sorrows and discontent? To him the apple of life was all fruit and it was sweet until the hour of his death, which came as peacefully as a summer nightfall and coaxed him away as sleep does a youth after a day of innocent play and pastime."

This is a human, kindly and pretty piece of prose, but it is altogether unsound as a moral proposition.

It holds up to admiration the old idea of the monk in his cell—who runs away from the world, as the renegade soldier flees from his fellows in battle.

The monk enters the cloister to escape "the battle of life": He thinks to save himself from temptation of the world, the flesh and the devil.

If it were not that the monk were mistaken in judgment it would be fair to call him a coward, as practically viewed he is.

But the point to be observed is that he conceives temptation to be an evil. It is not so. On the contrary, only thru temptation can men be good or bad. To dodge it is only to miss the opportunity of being a man; to fight it and to overcome is to be a man and a hero in the fight.

Why chase after things which bring us disappointment, sorrows and discontent?—why, because only by aiming at progress shall there be in the world good and evil.

Life is as a game or a battle. We all strive for victory. If some do not attain there is the pain of disappointment. If others do attain there is the joy of victory. But there can be neither victory nor defeat without entering the game or battle of life. And even in failure, there is the consolation of having been in the game or battle and felt the joy of the fight.

There is more pernicious doctrine than that "sweet content" is the ideal of life. If it is better to have loved and lost than never to have loved at all, as Tennyson put it; so it is far better to have been in the storm and stress of life than to live a life of "sweet content,"—away from the world, leaving it selfishly to others to carry on progress.

No, General Cameron may have been a dear old fellow; but he ran away from his fellows, from the life and work of the world, and morally viewed was a renegade soldier. Fall, fighting with your face to the foe!

As the front toward life that matters most—The tone, the point of view, The constancy that in defeat Remains untouched and true;

For death in patriot fight may be Less gallant than a smile, And high endeavor, to the gods, Seems in itself worth while! —Toronto World.

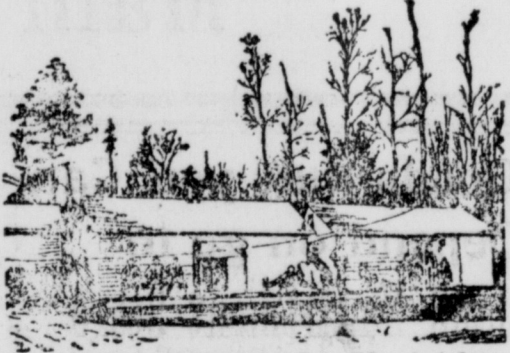


These had to be paid somehow.

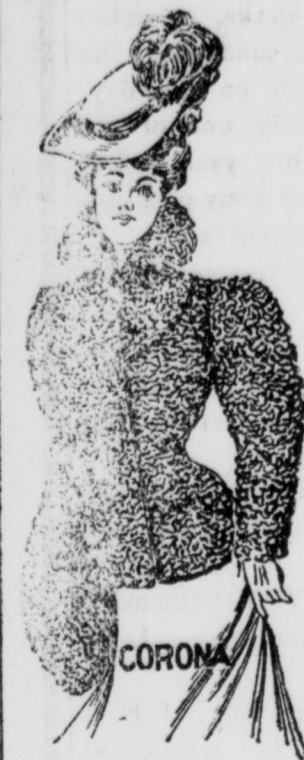

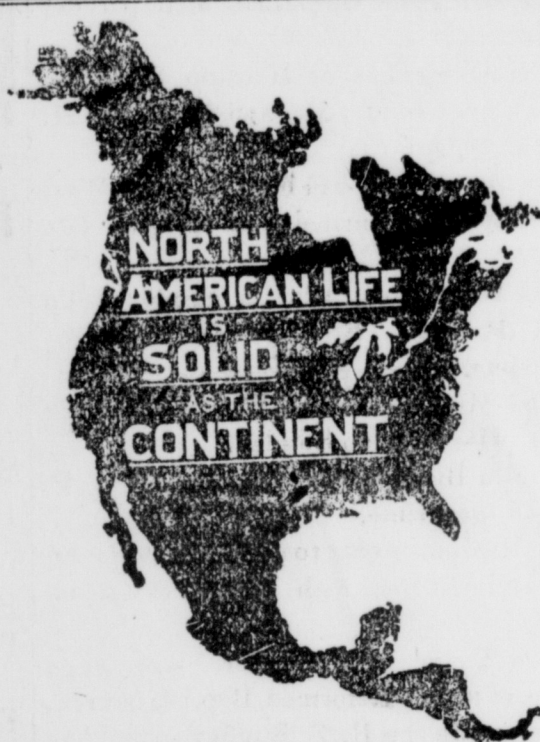
