The Outlook for Harvest.

Since the copious rains of last week crops have been coming right along. Some oats, ripened by reason of the continuous hot sunshine, were cut before the drought broke but the owners say they are hardly worth threshing. Most oatfields are still fresh and green and there is now no apparent reason why these should not yield a full crop.

Other grains give promise of a fair yield. Potatoes could not look better. They needed rain about as much as anything. While the tops were luxuriant, the hills, on being opened, were found to contain tubers few and small. They are growing yet and there is every chance of a much better crop than last year. Rust, the fatal pest that so often descends upon potatoes and causes rot, is not showing itself to any startling degree. The pastures and mowed lands have turned green again and there is a likelihood of abundant "fall feed," insuring an average butter crop.

A few farmers are still laboring with their haying but the most of them succeeded in getting their big crop in without a drop of rain.
