H. D. Thompson will leave today as a representative of Brunswick Lodge No. 99, I. O. O. F., to the grand lodge in Charlestown, P. E. I.

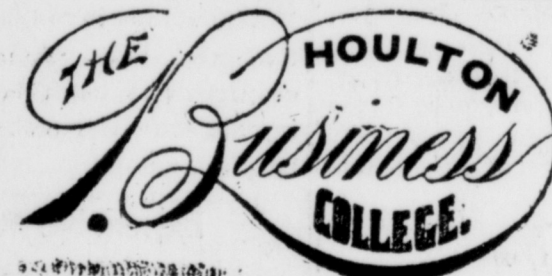
