Preserved Plums.

Fine and unspotted plums should be selected, and each must be pricked with a large needle. Weigh the fruit, and to every pound of it allow a pint of water and a pound of sugar. Put sugar and water together over the fire and make into a thin syrup. Let it boil until quite clear, removing any scum that may rise to the top. Do not put in the plums until the syrup is very clear, and then do not crowd them but put in only as many as the kettle will hold easily. Cook twenty minutes and remove as directed with peaches and quinces, spreading the plums out on plates to cool. When all are done put plums into the jars, pour the boiling syrup over them, and seal.
