Where Locusts are Food.

Locusts are a table luxury in Palestine and other places. The Jews fry them in sesame oil. In Arabia Petraea locusts are dried in the sun and ground into a kind of flour for baking. In Central Africa certain tribes make them into thick brown soup. In Madagascar they are baked in huge jars, then fried in grease and mixed with rice. In Algeria they simply are boiled in water and salted to taste. The Arabs grind and bake them as cakes, roast them in butter or crush them with camel's cheese and dates. But they only resort to this fare where locusts still are extensively eaten by the serfs, the insects usually are smoked in the first instance like fish. When required for consumption the legs and wings are broken off and the bodies are boiled, roasted, stewed, fried or broiled. The agreeable becomes mild and readily distinguished when cooked. Some locust soups scarcely are to be distinguished from beef broth. Fried in their own oil and slightly salted they acquire a pleasant nutty flavor. Locust eating tribes invariably grow fat when the food is plentiful. Grubs and caterpillars are eaten with avidity by Parisians and butterflies are eaten by the natives of Australia, silk worms in China and harvest flies by some Africans.—Chicago Tribune.
