A Draft off furnace dome, with no other assistance, is powerless to overcome the dust nuisance in shaking time. Only surplus dust rises of itself above the fire. Great bulk descends into ash-pit, and unless legitimate outlet is therein provided, dust will escape through ash-door elits and into operator's face.



Deaths From Scarlet Fever are Declining.

Now that smallpox, thanks to compulsory vaccination, has become a rarity in civilized communities, scarlet fever steps forward as the worst of the eruptive diseases of childhood.

It is a malady of enormous antiquity. Thucydides, writing nearly five hundred years before the beginning of our era, called it a heritage from the remote past. It has scourged the white races in all ages and all countries, and the physicians of all countries. and the physicians of all schools have leveled their heaviest artillery upon it, says Dr. Leonard K. Hirshbery in the August Delineator. Yet it remains a puzzle unsolved and for play. an enemy unconquered even to-day. We are in doubt as to its cause, and there is no
