R. through Temperance Vale, and out to Southampton, following the course of the Nackawick Valley, and thence up the Pokok bridge across the St. John River. A staff of engineers in charge of Chief Engineer Holt is now engaged in making the surveys, and if actual work is not started this winter it will commence with the first opening of spring.
