### Vaccine For Pneumonia.

Such surprisingly good results have attended the use of vaccine in the laboratories of pathology and bacteriology of the Tufts College medical school in combating pneumonia, that the officials there feel justified in believing that a wider application of the vaccine treatment in cases of labor pneumonia may be made with the hope of conquering this most fatal of all diseases in Boston and Massachusetts. In alcoholic pneumonia it was noted that rapid relief followed the administration of the vaccine and an abatement of delirium was prompt.

The Tufts officials offer to provide, free of cost, to any registered physician in the state, vaccine for treatment labor pneumonia, and when sufficient data has thus been obtained, they will ask the Massachusetts Medical Society to appoint a commission to study the results obtained.
