A COMMITTEE from the Carleton County Agricultural Society, composed of J. R. Brown, C. M. Aughton and B. B. Maczart went to Fredericton last week and interviewed the Provincial Government in regard to getting a grant for the exhibition to be held here next September. They were assured by the government that they would receive a grant of 75 per cent of the amount of the premium list, and on any new buildings erected a grant of 25 per cent of the cost of the same would be given.

ARRANGEMENTS have been made by the Department of Agriculture of the Province of New Brunswick with the Canadian Pacific Railway for single fair return tickets to St. John upon the Standard Certificate Plan, for the Amherst Fair, which will be held on December 6th, 7th, 8th and 9th. The excursion rate from St. John to Amherst is \$2.80. And one buying a first-class ticket for St. John should get a Standard Certificate from the Station Agent and this must be filled in and signed by the Secretary of the Amherst Winter Fair, and this certificate will be his return ticket from St. John to his own station. For the Horse Sale at St. John on December the 14th the same arrangements have been made.
