Electric Road Hartland to Foreston.

If plans that are being laid materialize there will soon be an electric railroad in operation between Hartland and Foreston, touching Rockland, Windsor, Knowlesville, and the smaller places along the way. The people here and along the proposed route will be as much astonished as pleased to learn of this. Some may call it a "wild goose scheme," and it may be one. But the fact remains that a short time ago John E. Stewart, the well known promoter, the man through whose energy the Tobique Valley Railway was built, he who is working for a line further up that river and to the North Shore, as well as being the promoter of the Tobique Narrows pulp mill scheme, was all over the ground where this latest enterprise will take its course. Mr. Stewart is not a capitalist, but he is making surveys of possible enterprises for those who are; and one of the principals in this case is Hon. A. B. Donworth, a prominent legal light and capitalist of Caribou.

It is proposed that the road be connected with the G. T. P. at Foreston and with the C. P. R. at Hartland. The benefits thus obtained will be manifold. Goods can be brought from the upper provinces by either route, and produce shipped in either direction. Should the C. P. R. not allow connections here, the competition will be all the greater as it is certain the G. T. P. would offer connections.—Hartland Observer.

The New Tannery.

On Friday His Worship Mayor Jones received the following proposition from J. D. Dickinson & Sons, in the matter of the erection of his tannery, recently destroyed by fire, which will be considered at a special meeting of the Town Council some evening this week:—

"That the town make us a loan of 50 p c of the valuation of our plant up to \$20,000, at 4 1/2 p c, for a term of five years. The first year to pay the interest only and the following four years to pay the interest and \$2500 each year. The Town to exempt us from all taxes and water rates for a term of five years.
