Baked Men.

Workers in porcelain factories are literally baked, but by some miracle of use and wont they remain sufficiently underdone to live. At least if they are not quite baked they endure a stronger heat than that which browns the Sunday sirlolin. The furnaces wherein is finished are kept at the fiercest heat used in any industry. A chain of workmen, their heads and bodies swathed in fireproof garments, take the finished pieces from the fire one at a time and pass them to the cooling room. The man at the head of this chain—who stands nearest the furnace—can work in only five minute shifts. In his interludes of rest he lies on a mattress drinking glass after glass of ice water from the hands of a small boy. At lunchtime all about the chain of men steaks grill.—Cincinnati Enquirer.

American Invasion of the Canadian West.

Agnes C. Laut in the Century: If half a million American settlers should suddenly pull up roots and migrate in a body to some foreign land the event would be heralded as one of the most epic movements of the century. Yet that is virtually what has happened, with little notice and less comment, in the last six years. In less than six years 388,000 American farmers have pulled up stakes in their native States and moved from Wisconsin, Minnesota, the Dakotas, Nebraska, Arkansas and Oregon, across the visible line of the international boundary to free homesteads in the Canadian Northwest. Moreover, 100,000 Americans have gone north as investors, speculators, miners, lumbermen.

A railroad traffic manager and a customs officer both told me the same thing; very few of the American homesteads came in with less than \$1,000 cash; many came in with capital ranging from \$3,000 to \$100,000. The capital brought in by the investing classes varies from the \$10,000,000 placed by the Morgan banking house in the Canadian Northern Railway to the \$200,000 and \$300,000 capital placed in actual cash by the land and lumber and fish companies. Average the American newcomer's capital at \$2,000 and the American invasion of Canada in the last six years represents in hard cash an investment of a billion dollars. From what I saw in a leisurely four months' tour of Canada—first by canoe, 1,590 miles among the settlers of the frontier beyond the railroad, then by rail twice across the continent—I have no hesitation in saying that a billion dollars estimate is too small by half.

For the Picnic Basket.

"For the picnic luncheon-basket try Huntington Eggs," says Woman's Home Companion for July. "Cut four hard-boiled eggs in halves crosswise, remove the yolks, and put the whites aside in pairs, otherwise you will make yourself extra work and trouble. Mash the yolks and add two tablespoonfuls of grated cheese, one tablespoonful of vinegar, one fourth of a teaspoon of mustard, and a few grains of cayenne, and salt to taste; then add enough melted butter to make the mixture of the right consistency to shape. Shape in the size of the original yolks, and refill the whites. Many prefer to omit the cheese and use in its stead finely chopped chicken or ham or sardines separated into small pieces. Wrap each egg up separately in a square of paraffin paper of the correct size, and pack them in an egg-box, (with the compartments) such as comes from the grocer."

Earthquakes and Their Causes.

Current Literature for July, summarizes some theories given by different authorities as to the cause of earthquakes. According to one of these authorities earthquakes on the sea's bottom, or near the sea coast, are due to an explosion of steam. The great depth and enormous pressure causes the water to percolate through the rocky crust of the sea's bottom until it comes to the intensely hot rocks twenty miles below surface. When the pressure of steam accumulates it shakes the solid crust and gets relief through opening, the final effect being the expulsion of lava at the edges of the sea. To this is attributed the uplifting of mighty mountain chains along ocean shores as in South America, British Columbia, Japan, Italy and elsewhere.

Accompanying these earthquake disturbances great waves are formed which cause sometimes immense destruction. These ocean waves are the result of the sinking sea bottom at some distance from shore and the flowing in of water from all sides to fill the depression. When the currents meet at the centre they raise a ridge by their mutual impact and a great wave is sent ashore. As a result of one of these waves striking the north shore of Japan in '96, villages were washed away along a coast line 70 miles in length, and 30,000 people perished from earthquake and inundation.

Sunshine grates have maximum strength

Sunshine Furnace has four triangular grate bars, each having three distinct sides. In the single-piece and two-piece grate no such-like provision is made for expansion or contraction, and a waste of coal always follows a shaking. On the left- and right-hand sides are cotter pins, which when loosened permit the grates to slide out. These four grate bars are made of heavy cast iron, and are finished up with bulldog teeth. The teeth will grind up the toughest clinker; and

because the grates are made in sections, not only can nothing but dust and ashes pass through, but after each shaking a different side can be presented to the fire. Also, with the Sunshine grate there is no back-breaking movements attached to the shaking. By gently rocking the lever, first on the left and then on the right, the ashes are released on both sides, and fall through into the pan.
