Gold Coast Liquor Traffic.

With regard to the importation and sale of spirituous liquors, wine, and beer in the northern territories of the Gold Coast, it is notified, with effect from July 1, that no spirituous liquors or wine may be imported into the Northern Territories, except by non natives who are conveying them for their own use, or except under the following conditions: Non-natives desiring to import spirituous liquors or wines for their own use to be shipped either directly to themselves or to any agent on their behalf in the Northern Territories, or for the purpose of sale to non-natives under licence, or in the capacity of agents on behalf of any other non-natives, must make a declaration and receive a permit from the Chief Commissioner of the Northern Territories or other appointed officer. The Chief Commissioner may, at his discretion, grant licenses to non-natives for the sale to non natives of spirituous liquors and wines in original bottles and not to be consumed on the premises. Each license will cost \$10, and will expire at the end of the year in which it was issued. Licenses may also be issued to natives and non-natives for the sale of beer in original bottles to natives and non-natives for consumption off the premises—such license to cost £5, and to expire at the close of the year in which issued.

The Antiquity of Man.

In his recent lecture in Washington, Professor Penck said that it has been known for quite a long time that in Western Europe man existed during the glacial epoch. We now know that the great ice age consisted of different glacial times separated by interglacial times. In glacial times the snow-line dropped 3,000 or 4,000 feet below its present level in the Alps, whereas in interglacial times it lay 1,000 feet higher than at present. Thus the temperature seems to have been higher in the interglacial periods than it is now. There is some reason for thinking that at least 20,000 years have elapsed since the glaciation, and that the man whose jaw-bone was recently found near Heidelberg lived 00,000 years ago.

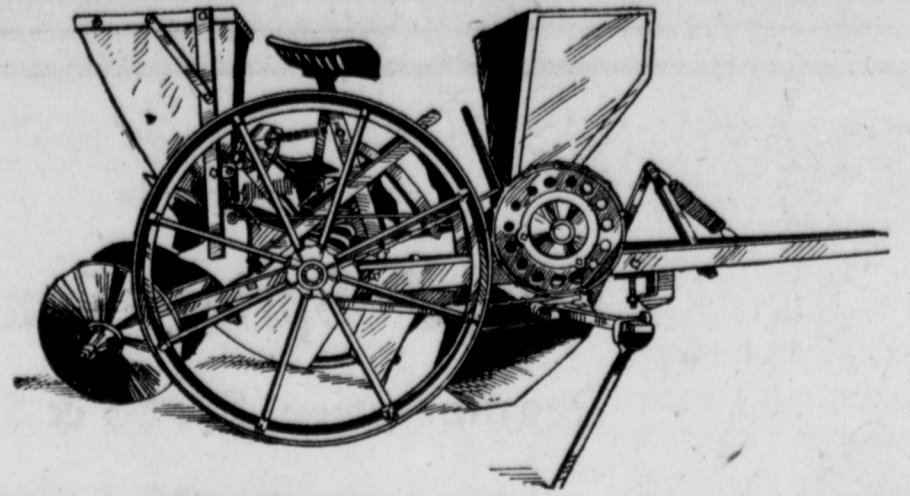
A Cure for Corns
