**Early Christmas Shopping.**

Christmas is no joy to employees in a de-  
partment store. In the terrible preceding  
fortnight many a girl, desperate with fatigue,  
wildly wishes the strain of life were past.  
Not for her the calm of the silent night,  
when angels sang to shepherds, and peace  
and good will were the burden of the song.  
After three days come evening still filled with  
long standing, and accumulating weariness.  
As the Day approaches, longer and longer  
grows the hours; and when the holidays at  
last arrive perhaps the poor shop girl has an  
opportunity to recuperate in bed, or perhaps  
her health is gone, and her chance to earn  
her living honestly never will return. A

3. Minister to actual needs. Give chiefly  
to children.
4. Choose presents having either useful-  
ness or beauty.
5. Demand articles which have been made  
and sold under condition fair and wholesome  
to the worker.
6. Remember that Christmas is of noble  
memory, not an occasion for display.

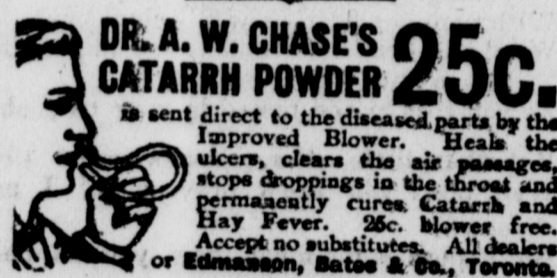
