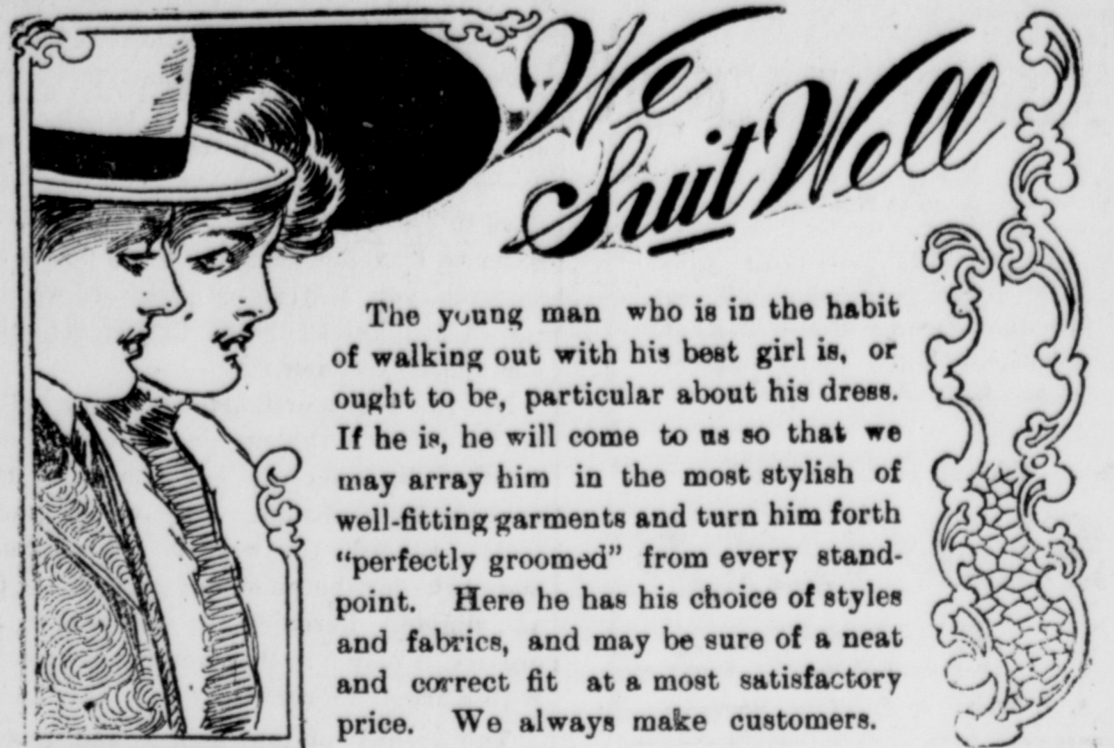
Evan Kupkey, of Bank of Montreal, Woodstock, spent the weeks end in his home here.
