### Sewing Suggestions.

For a handy needle book a piece of blue satin ribbon eight inches long and two inches wide is pointed at each end and finished with a small blue silk tassel. It is then stitched to a second piece of ribbon the same size and sewed across to form three small needle pockets. Into the three pockets are thrust small papers of needles.

For a plain baby dress choose a good grade of nainsook and use a pattern in which the sleeves and dress portions are cut together. Bring the fulness to the front and back, with scant gathers upon the shoulders. Sleeves should be long, medium, short and roomy. The skirt should be finished with a threeinch hemstitched hem. Trim with very narrow lace at the neck.

When a new skirt braid is required, rip off the old one, clean the skirt, baste on the binding, then stitch it with the machine, turn it up into position, baste in the edges, sew it fast by hand, and do not let the stitches show on the right side. When finished take out the bastings and press on the wrong side with a warm iron. Before removing bastings from any kind of work, cut them in short lengths, never pull long threads out, they draw up the work and you are fortunate if it does not tear.

Embroidery is one of the most fascinating amusements for long winter hours, and just now the artistic are making attractive doilies in huckaback. First the large doily is out-

lined upon the square of material and the edge is worked with a colored floss in a medium buttonhole stitch. The edge can be be perfectly plain with small or large scrolls or more intricate. After working the pat tern, cut it from the goods, press it on the wrong side and outline a wreath of oak leaves around the edge. These leaves should be large and worked with oak silkateen. The pattern employed is merely the darning stitch, woven back and forth, the same as all huckaback patterns. Only extremely large leaf or floral patterns will look attractive when fashioned in this manner.
