Mr. Stanley Sutton.

M. Stanley Sutton, third son of Mr. and Mrs. James F. Sutton, of this town, died at his home in Andover Sunday at 8.50 a. m. o'clock after an illness of three weeks in the 35th year of his age. He leaves a widow whose maiden name was Miss Julia Sloat, of Tracey Mills, one son, Tilton, and a daughter, Margaret. There are also two brothers, John E., in the West, and Wm., mechanical manager of the Woodstock Woodworking Co., and three sisters, Mrs. George Green, of Boston, Mrs. A. F. Baker, of New Westminster, and Pearl, at home.

Mr. Sutton was born in Lower Woodstock in the year of 1874 and received his education in the Woodstock grammar school. After leaving school he started in as an apprentice with the late John McAfee to learn the tinsmith trade and a few years later he went to Hartland where he conducted a tinsmith business for the late Charles Churchill. Subsequently he went to Andover where he started a tin business on his own account and by close attention to business he eventually branched entirely into the hardware business, and had one of the finest stores on the river north of St. John.

The deceased always took a deep interest in the affairs of the town, and served as a commissioner when the town was incorporated for water, light and power purposes. He was a member of Benjamin Lodge, F & A M., Andover, and Worshipful Master for three years, and it was during his term of office that the fine new lodge room now in use was built. He was also a member of Woodstock Chapter Royal Arch Masons and the Preceptory as well as Luxor Temple.

When the Provincial election was on Mr. Mr. Sutton was urged to come out as a government candidate, but he could not spare the time from his business.

It is only a few weeks since he was in Woodstock in apparently the best of health, and it came as a great shock to his friends here when the news of his death was heard.

The funeral took place in Andover on Tuesday, the remains being interred in the cemetery at that place. The funeral was in charge of Benjamin Lodge, F. & A. M.
