It was an easy task to disarm the Italians at one camp in Carleton county. While the majority of Italian laborers are peaceable and harmless, it is believed that this number is swelled by certain classes of offenders who escape punishment at home on condition that they leave the country. It is probably impossible either for the immigration authorities, or the contractors to make investigation into these matters so that undesirable men could be excluded. The Italians are good workers as a class, and considering their number and the way they are living on construction work, it could not be expected that there would be no quarrels. If they can be kept separated from their weapons they may be saved some days of repentance. —St. John Standard.
