Three Essentials in Dress.

Dress is no occult science, after all, but a
subject that has its own laws, principles and
methods that any one can grasp who is will-
ing to take the trouble, says Mrs Simcox in
the Delineator for July. It is all a matter of
line, color and materials. I hardly know
which women find most difficult to master.

When I see a tall, lank, bony woman,
straight as a pole and infinitely less graceful,
in a close-fitting princess dress of zebra
stripes nobly augmented at every seam by
long rows of buttons, I am perfectly sure
that the question of line is the insurmount-
able difficulty. You've seen it often, haven't
you? The empire dress on the woman who
is absolutely square from her square-toed
shoes, square cut figure to her square shoul-
ders and square face; the peach-basket hat on
the woman with the one-inch neck; the Dutch
collar and the accordion-plaited chin of the

them that you can think of right away, the
dreadful things that would be funny if they
were not pathetic.

I should love to put all those women in a
row and tell each of them just what her
trouble is—she probably wouldn't believe me
though, and I'd just be unpopular. For the
difficulty is they all think they know. There
is a subtle psychological process by which
any woman can convince herself that the
thing she wants is the one thing in the world
she should wear. There may be no connec-
tion in the world between the two, but you
can't make her see it.

Rhubarb Ways.

If properly cooked, shubarb is one of our
best spring "fruits." The stalks should be
gathered fresh, and should not be peeled, as
much of the flavor and most of the color is
lost by this means. It is best to cook a very
little at a time, letting it get quite cold be-
fore serving. A nice way to cook it is to cut
it, peel and all, in quarter-inch length pieces
and sprinkle a little sugar over it, leaving it
to stand over night; this will extract the
juice, and it can then be cooked in a very
few minutes, always keeping the vessel
covered while it is cooking. Another way is
to sprinkle with sugar, cover, and set in the
oven, where it will cook slowly. There
should never be any water added, if it can
be avoided, but if water is necessary, use
only the least possible amount. Cook al-
ways in porcelain-lined earthen, agate or en-
ameled ware—never in tin, copper, brass or
iron. Many prefer to cook it without the
sugar being added until it is done. Do not
cook it until it mashes," but let it be per-
fectly tender and done. For canning the
stalks should be cut in short lengths, the
sugar sprinkled over the night before, and
in the morning, the vessel containing it set
in the oven, closely covered, and when done,
can and seal as other fruits. The cold water
process is not always satisfactory, and much
of the flavor is lost in the process. Rhubarb
jelly is easily made, and is much liked by
many people. It is a "healthy" food, and is
inexpensive. For canning, and preserving,
June or July is early enough, as the stalks
are not then so juicy.

Rural Delivery.

Nine practical farmers between Gagetown
and Upper Gagetown have taken advantage
of the government's progressive policy for
rural mail delivery. New mail boxes are on
their way there and will be immediately in-
stalled. The boxes are consigned to W. P.
Simpson, of Welsford, who will demonstrate
their advantages and leave them in working
order.

In conversation with the Sun last night,
Dr. Colter said that it was the intention of
the department to give the farmers every ad-
vantage possible, and upon the installation of
these boxes he expected to receive many ap-
plications from others along the route.

The rural mail delivery was proving itself
a great boon to the farmers, and at a mini-
mum cost to the government, as the driver
delivering the mail receives only \$2.00 per
day per box for a daily mail, 75c. per box for
a tri-weekly mail and 50c. for a weekly mail.
Thirty-nine boxes have been set up on the
Welsford route and there is every indication
that many applications will be forthcoming
from other farmers in this district. St. John
Sun.
