

Carleton County Rifle Match.

The marksmen of the County will hold their Annual Rifle Matches on the Woodstock Range on the 15th and 16th of July. Matches to commence at 9 a. m. sharp. The Annual Meeting of the Association will be held on the evening of the 15th for election of officers and all other business. There is always a good interest taken in these matches and it is the hope of the executive to make this year's matches the best yet. The Irvine Cup, the Smith Cup, the Team Cup are coveted trophies. Last year the first two were won by the East Florenceville Club and the latter by the Mount Pleasant team.

Last year several subscriptions were received from all over the county to encourage this good work, and were much appreciated by the marksmen. The beautiful cup presented by B. F. Smith is the most coveted trophy on the program. It is hoped that the citizens will remember us again with liberal donations of any kind. All donations will be duly acknowledged in the press and very much appreciated.

The program will be the same as last year and is as follows:—

FIRST DAY.

- Extra series 200 yds, 9 to 10 a. m.
- Irvine cup match 200 yds, 10 to 12 a. m.
- Extra series 500 yds, 1 to 2 p. m.
- Irvine cup match 500 yds 2 to 4 p. m.
- Smith cup match 500 yds, 4 to 6 p. m.

SECOND DAY.

- Extra series 600 yds, 8.30 to 10 a. m.
- Irvine cup match 600 yds, 10 to 12 a. m.
- Extra series 800 yds, 1 to 2.30 p. m.
- Smith cup match 800 yds, 2.30 to 5 p. m.

Extra series matches are all 5 shots each without a sighter. Entrance fee 20c; competitors may enter as many times as they wish but cannot shoot more than two tickets in succession if there are others waiting to shoot.

Irvine cup match—7 shots and a sighter at each range 200, 500 and 600 yds. Entrance fee \$1.

Smith cup match—10 shots and a sighter at each range 500 and 800 yds. Entrance fee \$1.

Team cup match—Open to one or more teams of 5 men from any Club. To be shot in connection with first stage of the Smith match 10 shots at 500 yds. Entrance fee \$5. (Entrance fees do not cover ammunition which will be for sale on the range.)

All money prizes open to residents of the province, but the cups are restricted to residents of the county. The entrance fees will be increased by 25% on all competitors who do not belong to Club having a team entered in the team match.

A cordial invitation is extended to all marksmen of the province, especially the neighbouring counties.

S. W. Smith will again present a pair of field glasses for the best aggregate score in the Irvine, Smith and Team matches. This prize was won last year by B. C. McIsaac, East Florenceville.

In her 90th year, in the mellowed ripeness of a vigorous old age, with an enthusiasm that the years have been unable to rob her of; this mother of Israel who had not school privileges in her early days, and who cannot read or write, who had no Sunday school to welcome her in childhood, and not until she had reached adult age, and, I understand, entered the marriage relation; who remembers the text of the first sermon she heard when four years of age, "The Harvest is past, and the summer is ended and we are not saved." Who for 50 years or more, has been the centre and inspiration of S. S. work in her community; whose vision of the bright and better country is bright; whose confidence of entering there is firm, whose outlook is optimistic in an inspiring degree, whose love of the S. S. is a burning flame, whose manner is modest, language fluent, simple, quaint and direct, whose zeal is ardent and unquenchable, whose gratitude to friends for their remembrances on the occasion of her 90th birthday was most hearty, her speaking was prophetic in its impressiveness. She thinks of passing hence soon, but her presence, manner and readiness to speak her Master's message will live in the memories of those who heard her.
