

The Golf Championship.

Out of all the golfers in New Brunswick, only three, Dr. T. F. Sprague, and his sons, Clarence, Mr. and W. T. Sprague, took part in the championship games at Halifax last week. They returned home on Monday, speak in the highest terms of the treatment they received. The first day's play was pulled off in a heavy downpour of rain. Thirty-six holes were played and C. M. Sprague came in second with a score of 153, an average of 8½ for each nine holes. W. T. Sprague in that days play had a score of 166, and Dr. T. F. Sprague 172.

In the second days play Dr. Sprague was shown to play against his son Walter, whom he defeated. C. M. Sprague defeated C. J. T. Stewart, of Halifax. In the second round of this day's play Dr. Sprague was defeated by W. A. Henry, of Halifax, and C. M. Sprague defeated H. M. Wyde, of Halifax, thus leaving only one Woodstock player, C. M. Sprague in the semi-finals, in which he was successful in defeating his opponent, W. A. Henry.

In regard to the play in the final rounds between J. T. Henderson, of New Glasgow, and C. M. Sprague, of Woodstock, we quote the St. John Telegraph's Halifax correspondent: "J. T. Henderson, of New Glasgow, won the maritime golf championship on Saturday afternoon, defeating C. M. Sprague, Woodstock, by five holes with four to play in a thirty-six hole competition. As it was impossible for the New Brunswick player to win out with five holes against him, the remaining four were not played.

The winning of the championship by Henderson was no surprise to the competitors, for from the opening of the competition his brilliant playing had been a feature, and on Saturday afternoon when he entered the final round even his opponent, one of the best golfers in the maritime provinces, realized that he was pitted against a master of the game.

Mr. Sprague played in splendid form and made a strong bid for the championship, and golfers here feel confident that if he enters the competition next year he will win out.

The champion is a Scotchman, having recently arrived in New Glasgow from the home of golf. It is understood that Mr. Henderson has accepted the position of instructor of a large club in the west, and he, therefore, will be unable to play in the amateur ranks again."

Florenceville. Consolidated School.

The third year of the Florenceville consolidated School just closed, has certainly been the most successful in its history. In Normal School Entrance Examination this institution has made a record which, during the last few years at least has probably been unsurpassed by any school in the Province.

In First Class Entrance Miss Elna L. Giberson, valedictorian of her class, came first in the Province, leading by a good margin. Miss Giberson's average was 83.3 per cent, the next being Wilfred Dawson of Sackville, making a fraction over 80 per cent.

In Second Class Entrance, Mr. Percy Smith, who is only 15 years of age, came first in the County and Second in the Province.

Miss Lena Richie also ranks well in the list of those making over 70 per cent on First Class papers.

Miss Dela Sisson came third in the school for First Class with an average 67.7.

Miss Bertie Wolvorton came fourth average 65.6.

Of 11 working first class papers 10 were successful in making required average, although 2 may be affected by cross-test. Of these 6 made over 65 per cent.

All those trying matriculation Examinations were successful, Miss Lily Shaw leading the Consolidated schools of the Province. Miss Shaw's leading papers were French and Latin, making nearly the possible in the former.

The school has just received congratulations from Principal bridges of the Normal school.

Principal Squires, who is retiring to take a course in Harvard Law School, will be succeeded by Principal Tutill of Andover High School."
