William Henry Wightman

William Henry Wightman, who for many years was a prominent merchant at Central Falls, died suddenly of heart disease at his home, 264 Gano Street, yesterday noon. Mr. Wightman when a young man joined the rush to the California gold fields in 1850 and remained in that State seven years engaged in mining and mercantile pursuits.

He was born in North Kingstown, R. I., Dec. 15th, 1830, and was a son of Henry Holmes and Emily Chadsey lowing is the docket. Wightman, one of the oldest and most distinguished families of New England who first settled in his birthplace in 1659. On May 15th, 1859, he was united in marriage with Miss Hannah Melissa Revnolds of his native town.

Following his marriage he entered the business of merchant at Central Falls where he was located many years, after which he retired, going to Groton, Conn,, and came about 23 years ago to Provi dence where he has since lived. He leaves a widow, a son, Stephen Reynolds Wightters, Mrs. (Dr.) G. B. Manzer, of Woodstock, N. B., and Miss Abby May Wightman, who lives at home, also four grand children. The late Miss Emma Wight man who was connected with the State Board of Charities for many years and who died eight years ago, was another Sunday Journal.

Surgeon.
