Wheat Crop of United States.

The Bureau of Statistics at Washington has sent out a report which shows that the export trade in breadstuffs has materially fallen off in 1909 as compared with 1908. During the first nine months of last year the amount of wheat exported was 67,178,935 bushels, while during the corresponding part of this year it was only 27,768,901 bushels; the amounts of flour for the two years were, respectively, 9,428.347 and 6,288,283 barrels. These statistics call for some explanation, and accordingly one is furnished by the Bureau.

The theory put forward is the shortage in the supply of wheat available for export is due to the increase that has taken place in home consumption of breadstuffs. In so far as there has been such an increase it must be due to an increase in population, of which there can be no doubt. But this is not a complete account of the situation, for the increase has taken place mainly in cities or towns, and not to any great extent in agricultural districts. In other words the urban population, which consumes and dees not produce breadstuffs, has been rapidly increasing, while the rural population, which does farm, has remained comparatively stationary.

Canadians have a special interest in this report, which simply confirms the prediction made by President Hill of the Great Northern Railway a few months ago. There is no longer any great extent of wheat-producing land to be procured by the intending farmer in the United States without paying a high price for it, and most of the virgin land now obtainable is useless without irrigation. At no distant day the exportation of wheat and flour from the United States will cease, and this state of equilibrium will be succeed ed by one in which breadstuffs will be im ported instead of exported.

Meanwhile, as settlement progresses in the Canadian West, and as transportation facilities are promptly and extensively furnished, the amount of wheat exported from Canada will rapidly increase, all the more so because a large proportion of the immigrants settling in the West are experienced Western farmers from the United States. The moral for the Canadian farmer is to make ready by improving his methods to take full advantage of the favorable trend of conditions. -Toronto Globe.
