Extension of Rural Mail Service.

It is expected as soon as spring opens that
the post office department will be receiving
quite a number of petitions for rural mail
delivery on the provincial mail routes. At
present the new service is in operation on
four routes—St. John and St. Martins, Flor-
enceville and Summerfield, Centreville and
Knoxford, the last three in Carleton county.
Arrangements were made with the con-
tractors when the service was first started to
pay a sum for collecting and delivering letter
in addition to the contract price. New tend-
ers will include the rural mail delivery on
the routes where it is in operation.

There are between 500 and 600 mail routes
in the province, some of them fifty or sixty
miles in length, and the introduction of the
rural delivery on these routes would necessitate
their being sub-divided and shortened.

In order to obtain the service on a new
route a petition on a form supplied by the
department has to be forwarded to the post-
master-general. It depends upon the num-
ber that apply whether or not the request is
granted. On routes where the rural delivery
is already in operation, additional boxes are
supplied on each applicant paying the fee of
\$3, which the department charges for a box
with necessary fittings. No additional
routes are likely to be opened until the frost
is out of the ground.

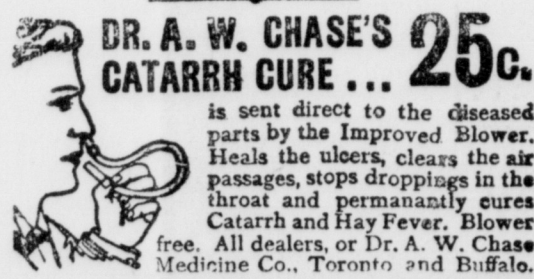
What Music Does For Us.
