**Radium as the Earth's Heat  
Supply.**

It is probable that the presence of heat  
producing radium in the earth will prolong  
that cooling process from which scientists  
predict the ultimate death of our planet.  
Professor John Joly, of the University of  
Dublin, writes in the February Harper's of  
"Radium and the Earth's Internal Heat,"  
explaining the latest calculations of the  
earth's age with respect to the quantity of  
radium still existing within it. There are  
says Professor Joly, 20,000 tons of radium  
dissolved in the waters of the seas and more  
than a million tons of radium contained in  
the sediments which are deposited over  
the floor of the ocean." Scientists calculate  
that the earth is already about a hundred  
million years old, and with this amount of  
radium still in existence it would not seem  
necessary to apprehend a near fulfilment of  
Mother Shipton's famous prophecy.

**A Jag in Each Piece.**

What is said to be one of the largest  
wedding cakes ever made for actual use is  
receiving its finishing decorations to-day  
at a Chicago hotel. It will be sent  
by express to Hamilton, Ont. The cake  
is nearly six feet in height, five feet in di-  
ameter at the base and weighs practically  
a quarter of a ton. It will be served at  
the wedding of Chas. P. McCollm, of Mus-  
cotine, Iowa., to Miss Aileen Davis, of  
Hamilton, January 27. There are to be  
600 guests at the wedding reception.

Some of the chief parts of the cake are  
90 pounds of sugar, 400 eggs, 40 pounds  
of butter, 90 pounds of currants, 60  
pounds of raisins, 62 pounds of citron, 37  
pounds of chopped almonds, 120 pounds  
of flour, 1 1/2 pounds of spice, 15 quarts of  
cognac, 15 quarts of sherry wine, and  
three quarters of a pound of baking soda.  
All of the fruit was soaked in liquor for  
ten days.

again.

Mr. Colpitts—And places have been raided  
again and again.

Coun. Fleming thought Mr. McLean was  
quite right and Mr. Brown was wrong in ad-  
vising that he should try to enforce the law  
himself.

The petition was referred to the Scott Act  
Committee.

The following petition on motion of Coun.  
Gillmor was read:—

To the Warden and Municipality of Carleton.

We the women of the W. C. T. U. of  
Glassville do hereby ask your honorable body  
to assist us in a legal way to stop the sale of  
Lager Beer in the parish of Aberdeen.

We propose putting on a license high  
enough to make it prohibitive and that the  
license must be sold only under conditions.

1st. It must be sold only to those who  
furnish rooms and meals.

2nd. The licensed seller must have a re-  
commendation from the parish clerk.

3rd. That said licensed seller must not  
sell within two miles of a church.

4th. Said licensed seller must not sell to  
any minor under any condition, under a pen-  
alty and such penalty must not be less than  
two hundred dollars.

Your honorable body found a way to rid the

Money received through the selling of this  
license to be given the Woodstock Hospital.

If the municipal council will lend us their
