## Teachers' Pensions.

Messrs. W. J. S. Myles, W. M. McLean and Thomas Stoddard, of St. John, met the Government Saturday last, as representatives of the New Brunswick Teachers' Association and urged the adoption of the teachers' pension scheme which they had presented to the late Government and which calls for pensions of \$400 annually for male teachers of sixty years of age and \$250 for female teachers of 55 year, of age upon thirty years' service in the teaching profession in the public schools of the province.

The delegation's estimate was that the cost of putting of the scheme into operation would be about \$12,000 per year.
