The terrible catastrophe in Italy which caused the inhabitants of the ill-fated city of Messina to believe that the end of the world had come is only a forecast on a small scale of what many eminent scientists believe will be the end of the world, says Cassel's Saturday Journal.

That eternal problem of how the world will end is the opinion of many a matter for scientific investigation, and it is curious that the majority believe that the earth will open up and fly to pieces in the most gigantic earthquake ever known—an earthquake that will wipe all life from the globe before the actual destruction of the earth is complete.

The late Grant Allen firmly believed that the world would end by the crust of the earth eventually giving way beneath the colossal weight above it; and Abbie Dupin, one of the greatest scientists of France, believes that doomsday will begin with a war that will envelop the greatest nations in Europe, this being followed by a plague the like of which was never known, culminating with an earthquake that will practically shake the world to pieces.

H.G. Wells, whose scientific prophecies are well known, is, however, of a different opinion. The world will end, he declares, by its becoming entirely frozen over. It is a well known fact that every year more ice accumulates around the Poles; in short, many millions of tons of ice in excess of that of the year previous settle about the earth's extremities each year, and in Mr. Wells' opinion this will gradually extend until the whole world is frozen over and every living thing is thus destroyed.

Several scientists are of opinion that we shall perish by fire, and this old world of ours with us. Nikola Tesla, the great American, is convinced that, the atmosphere of the world being so fully charged with elec-

tricity, the result will be a gigantic explosion by spontaneous combustion, when the world will be entirely encircled with flame which in the space of a few seconds will destroy all life.

Two of the world's greatest scientists firmly aver that the end of the world will be brought about by astronomical conditions.

Take Prof. Marienberg, the noted Austrian student. In his opinion the earth will fly from its orbit and come in contact with one of the other planets that may chance to be in a direct line. The earth being comparatively small will, of course, get the worst of it and split into fragments at the collision. But, of course, directly the world swerved from its orbit all living things would be, and such an earthquake take place as would completely put the Italian catastrophe in the shade.

London Police.

The peace and safety of some 7,000,000 of people are dependent upon about 17,000 to 18,000 policemen. We know that they do their work well; most of us freely recognize this. Foreign visitors speak in glowing terms of their virtues and efficiency. Few weeks pass in which each of us do not owe something to their good sense and courtesy. Superseding watchmen and constables notoriously inefficient, the London police have not been transformed into a military force in disguise, very fit to repel a foreign invader, but ill-trained for the little combats and petty difficulties of the street. They are not in this respect like the guardians of some continental cities, who might, with a slight change in uniform take their place in the ranks of the regular army. That perfection of drill with its compatible with general usefulness, is too apt to paralyze the power of individual initiative is unknown. The best point of the system is that, while there is a developed organization underlying it, individuality is encouraged; the policeman is permitted to be himself, to be the friend of the young and the weak, to be free to show himself as he is and at his best as a man. "It is a body of men," says a correspondent, "who, though distinctive in their character from all others, are yet related to the people whom they serve by ties of intimate personal association which are not to be found in any other country in the world. The policeman of London is not merely guardian of the peace; he is an integral part of its social life."

In many a back street, and slum, he not merely stands for law and order; he is the true handy man of our streets, the best friend of a mass of people who have no other counsellor or protector.

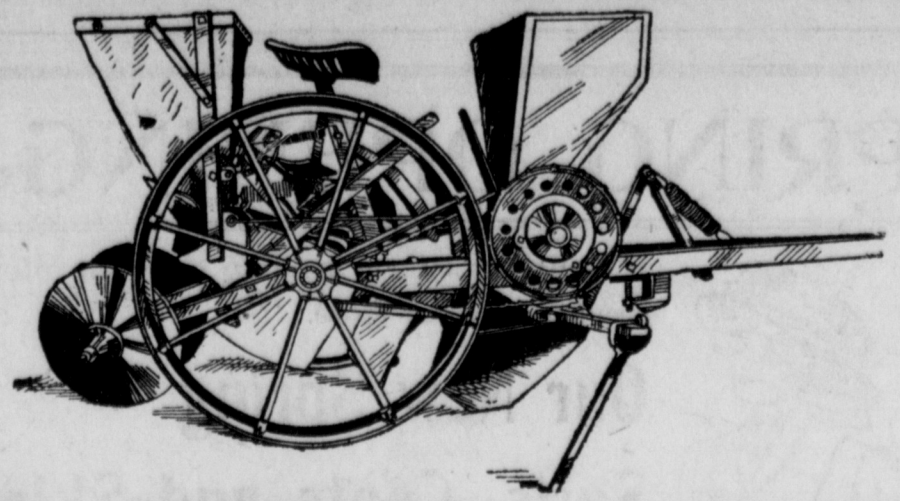
