Hens Eating Their Eggs.

The habit acquired by some hens during
the early laying season, of eating their own
eggs, is not a natural one, and probably arises
from being kept under unnatural conditions,
just as the habit of eating her young comes
to the brood sow which has been fed and
cared for in a mistaken way. Hens usually
acquire this habit in the winter time, and
when being confined with little exercise, or
when being fed with perhaps to little animal
food.

The habit once acquired, is rather hard to
deal with, and it is usually the best plan to
kill the offender, as she will in all probability
persist in it until she has eaten more than
her own worth of eggs. Hens which are
allowed some exercise and are fed a fair pro-
portion of meat scraps and animal food, are
not apt to develop this habit. See that
there is plenty of light, ventilation, exercise,
and some animal food.

New York's Business Women.

Any one from London visiting New York
cannot but feel and express surprise at the
large number of girls fitting about Wall
street. In this vicinity there are almost as

What Japan pays for Life.

(Cleveland Leader.)

If a Japanese has no more than \$500 a
year for his entire income the government
of his country demands and takes only 17
per cent of it. It leaves him about \$415 for
himself and his family.

But if a Japanese has \$50,000 a year—an
immense income in his country—he must
give up about 63 per cent to the government.
Then he actually pays an income tax of about
\$31,500. All that is left for him is about
\$18,500.

That does not tell the whole story. Ev-
erything is taxed in Japan. The indirect as
well as the direct burdens of government
are numerous and heavy. It is impossible
to buy anything without paying something
to the government. On the average about
one-third of the entire earnings and other in-
come of the Japanese people goes to the gov-
ernment. Out of every three dollars which
they make or get in any way one must be
given up to the State.

No western nation knows anything of such

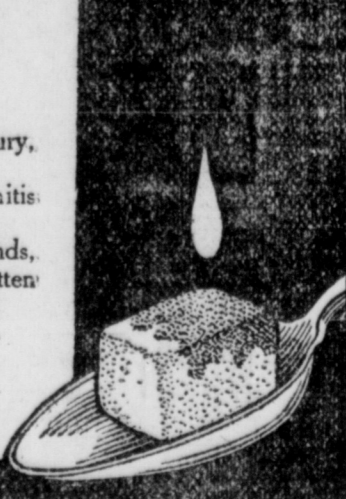
