three cents manurial value for every ton of milk sold. Use nothing but the best dairy salt in butter. Otherwise good butter is ruined by

poor salt or salt which imparts a bad flavor. There should be no smoking about where the milking is done or about the milk at any time. Milk absorbs the bad qualities of tobacco smoke quickly.

Every time cream is added to the cream jar, stir the whole contents, so that it will be well mixed and promote even ripeniag of the

Rules for butter making learned from a book are a very good thing, but by no means the whole thing. Experience and close observation are essential to success.

There will be much cleaner milk if the ud. der is wiped off with a damp cloth, and the long hair clipped off of the udder and flanks. and tail before milking.
