J. C. Hovey with a crew of men has resumed operation at the Cobbler-Sexton mine. Some fine samples of copper ore were brought up to town on Saturday and are on exhibition at H. G. Noble's store.  
The 15,000 shares that were recently put on the market were all purchased within a week, and persons wishing to purchase stock now can get the same on application at the company's office.  
C. LeB. Miles, C. E., who is a stockholder in the company, recently sent samples of the ore to his brother in Montana with the following result:  
Copper 12 1/2 per cent.  
Gold 80 cents.  
Silver 2 4 10/100 sp.  
This is a splendid showing, much better than the ore being mined in the great copper sections in Montana.  
Mr. Miles recently made a survey of the mine which can be seen at the company's office.  
One redeeming feature in connection with the Cobbler-Sexton mine, is the faith placed in its ultimate success by the manager, J. C. Hovey. Mr. Hovey is a man who has had years of practical experience in the copper country, and although at times he has met with discouragement, he is confident that by pushing on the work paying ore will be found in sufficient quantities to assure the putting in of a concentrator.

**Woodstock Creamery Co.**

The plant of the Carleton Creamery Co., was sold at auction on Wednesday last, and was bid in on behalf of a new company. It will be reorganized under the name of the Woodstock Creamery Co., and will be under the management of Geo. Ransom, an experienced man, who has had charge of the Dominion Government Creamery at Scotsburg, N. S., for the past eight years. Arrangements are now being made to dispose of the outside skimming stations, with the intention of concentrating everything in Woodstock.

Mr. Ransom was recommended to the new company by Mr. Ruddick, Chief Dairy Commissioner of Canada, at Ottawa, and who speaks very highly of his management at Scotsburg.

It is Mr. Ransom's intention to start in on the 1st of April to put the Woodstock plant in first-class working order. He also intends to hold meetings in different parts of the county, where requested by the farmers, for the purpose of getting in touch with the cream supply, and will be glad to have all in sympathy with the business call on him at the Woodstock Creamery after April 18th.

The new company hope to make arrangements with the C. P. R., whereby they can collect cream from all stations from Andover to Woodstock.

If the farmers will do their part this company see no reason why a carload of cream should not be collected between these points daily.
