THE death took place on Monday after an illness of typhoid fever, of Helen, aged 13 years, only daughter of Mrs. Vincent Kelley. The funeral will take place Wednesday morning 9 o'clock from St. Gertrudes Church.

JOHN C. SEELEY, a prominent business man and citizen of Houlton, Me., died at Washington, D. C., on Sunday, Feb. 14th. Mr. Seeley was a resident of Carleton County for a number of years. He married Mary A. Drake of Jacksonville, who died about five years ago.

THE dance in the theatre on Monday evening last was attended by about sixty couples and a most enjoyable evening was spent. Music was furnished for the occasion by Donovan's orchestra of Houlton. Refreshments were served at intermission. Dancing was kept up until three o'clock next morning.

A YOUNG man named Foster, brother of Chief Albion R. Foster, of the Grand Trunk Pacific police, was painfully injured Friday on the G. T. P. work near Stanley. He had his leg badly cut in the fleshy part above and near the knee. About eighteen stitches had to be taken in the cut, which was upwards of two inches deep.

INSPECTOR LINDSAY on Friday suspended the beer license for the building in Queen street occupied by Hugh Shannon, and has notified the town clerk Mr. Hartley of the suspension giving as a reason that Shannon keeps his shop open after the hours prescribed by the license. Howard McDonald was fined \$100.00 last week for a second offence in violation of the Canada Temperance Act.

Walter H. Swift, for many years a popular conductor on this division of the C. P. R., has been appointed to the position of Train Master, an office new to this section. His territory covers the same ground as that of the divisional superintendent and his duties are to see to the proper make-up of trains, their inspection, etc. His office will be at Aroostook Jct.

A CALL has been extended to Rev. A. G. Kennedy of the Baptists of Woodstock and it is understood that Mr. Kennedy will accept the offer. He will leave Sussex during April to assume his new charge. Mr. Kennedy has been connected with the Main Street Baptist church for several years and is highly thought of by the members of his congregation, who are loath to part with him.—Sussex Record.

JOHN GRASS, a well known and prosperous farmer, died of typhoid fever at his home in Hartford, Carleton County, on Monday morning, in the 47th year of his age. He is survived by a widow, who was a Miss Wilson daughter of the late William Wilson, one son, William, and three daughters, Maud, Edith and Estella, at home. The funeral took place on Tuesday, the services were conducted by Rev. A. W. Teed. The burial took place at Jacksonville.

- 1st. Construct, equip, maintain and a line or lines of railway from a point at or near Grand Falls in the County of Victoria, or St. Leonards in the County of Madawaska, in said Province along the valley of the Saint John River to a point at or near the City of Saint John in said Province, with power to build a branch line through the County of Carleton to some point on the Boundary Line between Canada and the United States of America.
